
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# To the Citizens of the City of Hilliard





## City of Hilliard - Total CFS




## Norwich Township - Total CFS

# Response Time Summary




The Division of Police categorizes calls for service into four levels of response. Each level of response is prioritized based on the urgency of the call for service requested. Life threatening situations are considered a Priority 1 response and warrant the most expedient response. Priority 2 responses are reserved for serious threats of physical harm, crimes in progress and auto accidents. Priority 3 and 4 calls are considered routine and usually consist of criminal report requests, animal complaints and traffic complaints.









# Training



The Division sends, on average, over 40 employees each quarter to outside agency schools for specific subject training. Classes include:


