


Mission Statement



Traffic Safety

Traffic safety is of high priority in Hilliard. In 2015, the agency launched its traffic safety unit. Members are assigned to cruisers and motorcycles and have received specialized training. The traffic safety unit is supplemented by the work of patrol officers.

Investigations Bureau

CIU: The Criminal Investigations Unit conducts a wide variety of investigations that require special expertise, including: arson, auto theft, burglaries, child abuse, embezzlement, financial crimes, forgery, fraud, homicides, identity thefts, juvenile matters, missing persons, narcotics, rape, robbery and sex crimes. The unit is provided with all the necessary equipment essential to investigating a wide range of offenses from breaking and entering to homicide. To assist with these investigations, detectives frequently receive advanced training in all areas of criminal investigation, including crime scene analysis and evidence collection. This advanced training, coupled with extensive experience, ensures that the citizens of Hilliard receive the best possible service.

One of the largest cases the unit investigated, a school shooting plot at Hilliard Davidson High School, resulted in the suspect being convicted of conspiracy to commit murder. The offender received a prison sentence.


SIU: The Special Investigations Unit is the proactive investigation and enforcement arm of the Division of Police. SIU is responsible for investigating narcotics, prostitution and gambling offenses, as well as fugitive apprehension, surveillance operation and search warrant executions. SIU also investigates pattern crimes that affect quality of life for residents. It is supervised by a sergeant and staffed by detectives.





Detective Chad Wood received his Master Criminal Investigator certificate from the Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy in October. The program requires 192 hours of courses on various topics, including criminal investigation, sex crimes investigation, computer crimes and death investigation.

Community Relations



Fingerprinting The agency debuted its EZ Child ID fingerprinting system in the summer of 2017. This tool allows parents to have their child's fingerprints and physical description at their fingertips should their child go missing. The kit was purchased through a generous grant from the Hilliard Community Foundation and Advanced Drainage Systems (ADS).

CPA: Citizens Police Academy

The 9th class of the Hilliard Citizens Police Academy joined our alumni organization. This interactive program teaches students what it's like to be a police officer, and creates a growing nucleus of well-informed citizens. Every Tuesday for 14 weeks evening students begin by eating dinner — which has been donated by our local businesses — with police and fire personnel. Classes focus on various topics, including criminal Investigations, laws, K-9, radar, dispatch (NRECC) and fire.



WSD: Women's Self Defense

One of our most popular programs is Women's Self Defense. This free course focuses on prevention strategies, with self-defense options which could be used as a last resort if attacked.



Officers enjoyed the opportunity for casual conversation over a cup of Joe as part of the agency's newest program,

Coffee with A Cop. This is your chance to ask questions, voice concerns and get to know the law enforcement in Hilliard — one cup of coffee at a time.

Opportunities at Hilliard PD

A Hilliard police officer performs proactive patrols to ensure compliance with laws and ordinances, answers calls when crime is suspected or an emergency occurs, and takes action to prevent crime and to apprehend criminals.

K9 K9 Officer Eros, a Belgian Malinois, retired in January from the Hilliard Division of Police. In October of 2017, K9 Jawaak became the agency's sixth dog to serve in the Division since the program was established in June of 2005. On average, the Division's K9 unit assists in 60 arrests per year, per team. Each team is used about 150 times per year, mostly for narcotic detection. The unit is often called upon

by other law enforcement agencies throughout Ohio for assistance, and works closely with Hilliard City Schools in its dedication to keeping the schools drug-free.
