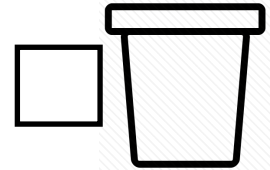
Scavenger Hunt

Shovel: Can come in a variety of sizes and the shovel head can vary in width depending on the job it has to do. This is a very useful tool for any gardener.

Plant container: The Egyptians were among the first to use flower pots to transport plants from one place to another.



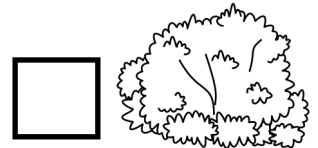
Sapling: This is the term used for a young tree. Often, very young saplings are not woody and can be eaten by many animals. As the tree ages, though, they begin to become covered with bark, which provides it protection.

Recycle bins: Recycling leads to conservation of natural resources. Using recycled material for manufacturing requires less energy to make items.



Trees: These are the longest-living organisms on earth. Some trees are as old as 4,800 years. That's a lot of birthdays. Trees can absorb as much as 48 pounds of carbon dioxide a year.

Bushes: Unlike trees, bushes can have multiple stems. Because they don't grow as tall as trees, they can be used as natural fences.



Tulips: These flowers are native to central Asia, but got popular in Europe. At one point in the 1600s they were the most expensive flower, some costing more than a house.

Birds: Did you know there are 434 species of birds in Ohio? The cardinal was designated the official Ohio state bird in 1933 due to its prevalence throughout the state.
