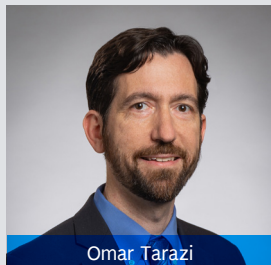

HILLIARD SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS



HEART
FOR SERVICE, SAFETY
AND SOLUTIONS

Two teenage boys sat on the hallway floor at Hilliard Davidson High School, sharing a tablet as they studied vocabulary words for an upcoming biology quiz.

“Hey, Officer Sam,” one called to the police officer walking toward them. “Want to ask us some questions?”

“Sure!” he replied.

It was just another day on the job for Hilliard Division of Police Officer Sam DiSaia, who serves as a School Resource Officer in the building (though, admittedly, he is not an expert on biology definitions.) DiSaia had just finished ensuring doors were locked in the back of the school and securing the parking lot before the impromptu quiz session.

students, teachers and staff through their everyday presence and visibility.

“It’s more than patrolling the hallways. It’s about building the relationships with students who may need a caring adult as well as a professional police officer,” Chief Grile said. “Being embedded in each school building’s culture results in an overall safe and secure learning environment.”

Davidson High School Principal Joyce Brickley has been an administrator in the district for 20 years and has worked with several SROs throughout her career.

Brickley said she “couldn’t even fathom doing this job without a school resource officer,” praising the “knowledge,



“I love talking to everyone,” he said. “And it’s easier to talk to people when you see them every day — especially young people.”

Walking through the hallways, he energetically rattled off various facts about the school, complimented the cafeteria staff and greeted each student. DiSaia estimated he knows most of the names of the more than 1,800 people in the building.

“The first two weeks the freshmen don’t talk to me, but I smile a lot and tell jokes, so they come around,” he added with a laugh.

There are a total of six SROs working inside Hilliard City Schools. One officer is assigned at each of the three middle schools and three high schools in the district. In past years, an officer was assigned to each high school and a single officer served all three middle schools. Officers also make regular contact at the elementary schools.

School resource officers fulfill multiple roles in addition to preventing and responding to school-based crime, said Chief of Police Eric Grile. Officers provide valuable support to

perspective, and calming effect” the officers bring each day to the learning environment.

“There’s this intuitive balance of knowing when to be proactive and reactive,” she said. “Officer Sam has a knack for connecting with students and understands that if the kids don’t think you care about them, they won’t listen to you.”

As the school day continued, DiSaia resolved a conflict between two other students, answered a legal question from a staff member, and directed traffic to allow buses to exit for their afternoon routes.

“I just talk to people all day long, and sometimes someone stops me with an issue,” he said. “I see my job as finding solutions.”

WARNOCK

A Catalyst for Community Change



Blending passion and profession has always been a dream for Andy Warnock.

The 38-year-old businessman and real estate agent has served as a catalyst for the revitalization of Old Hilliard and surrounding downtown areas. His most recent project, the Westwood Fieldhouse, will open its doors this winter.

Warnock grew up 25 miles north of Hilliard in Delaware, where he played basketball for Delaware Hayes High School and then at Ohio Wesleyan University.

“Athletics have always been a big part of my life,” Warnock said. “So, getting to combine sports with real estate, philanthropy, and community engagement is something I’m very proud of.”

The Westwood Fieldhouse is a 17,000-square-foot indoor basketball and volleyball venue on Brown Park Drive in Hilliard. The facility will include two high-school-regulation courts and four high-school-regulation volleyball courts, along with a party room available for corporate events or family celebrations. The gym will partner with the Mid-Ohio Pumas, a local AAU basketball program with 72 teams from 4th grade to 11th grade, to make this their home base throughout the season.

“The beauty of basketball, to me, is that you have people from all walks of life playing a game and sharing a similar passion, and that was the spark to this facility,” Warnock said. “Beyond profitability, there’s those intangible benefits that you get from building something like this and, hopefully, bringing together neighbors of all socio-economic and racial backgrounds.”

Warnock is the co-founder of The Westwood Collective, a local development company with more than 20 unique assets and properties in Hilliard. His start in real estate began with apartment investments, and he’s owned or managed as many as 2,600 apartment units at any given time in his career.

“Running apartments just doesn’t get me excited anymore,” Warnock said. “My goal now is to fill niches in the Hilliard community, such as a date-night restaurant or a really cool Air BNB-type space,” Warnock said. “For me, there’s so many opportunities in our backyard where I can make a difference by investing here locally.”

Warnock’s portfolio is constantly growing, and he doesn’t plan on slowing down anytime soon. Just this year, he launched The Junction by Westwood, converting an existing warehouse in Old Hilliard into an office/incubator space for local entrepreneurs and small businesses. The facility

will also house Sexton's Pizza and includes a public-private partnership with the City of Hilliard Recreation and Parks Department to use part of the warehouse for maintenance on park equipment.

Warnock's group is also behind the construction of eight patio homes on Norwich Street, as well as the second-floor expansion and renovation of Legacy Smokehouse, which will include an open-dining area known as Rickhouse 41.

"Hilliard has an old-town charm and community aspect that makes this place so unique," Warnock said. "We've seen a renaissance of several other Central Ohio communities in recent years and Hilliard is right on the heels of that."

Westwood is named after the street Warnock grew up on in Delaware and also a tribute to the great UCLA basketball coach John Wooden, "The Wizard of Westwood."

"I love people, and my wife Ashley and I have a passion for local youth," said Warnock, who also runs the Dot's Tots Foundation, a non-profit supporting foster care families, children with debilitating diseases and injuries, and teens in support of college. "Life is richer when it's shared with others, and I feel like with the growth of Hilliard and its family-centered dynamics, we're on the cusp of something pretty special here."

ENVIRONMENTAL ENEMY

Each year millions of tons of Styrofoam are thrown away, taking up valuable space in landfills. That's why some community leaders have come together to launch a Styrofoam recycling program that's capable of shrinking a stack of Styrofoam the size of an SUV down to the size of a concrete block.

With the help of a grant funded by Solid Waste Authority of Central Ohio (SWACO), members of Hilliard's Environmental Sustainability Commission (ESC) have partnered with the City's Operations Division to purchase Central Ohio's first Styrofoam densifier.

The new machine allows residents of Hilliard and nearby communities to recycle extruded polystyrene – the rigid Styrofoam found largely in electronics and appliance packaging – to help divert waste from landfills.

Since polystyrene is not an accepted recyclable material in Franklin County, it often ends up in the landfill. In 2019, SWACO reported 6,882 tons of Styrofoam were sent to its landfill.

“This new machine will keep some of that foam out of curbside waste bins and dumpsters, which will extend the life of the landfill,” said ESC Chair, Kristen Hosni.

The densifier, located just outside the Hilliard Municipal Building and operated by City staff, compacts large blocks of polystyrene into dense bricks.

According to Recreation and Parks employee Geoff Dew, the machine shreds the Styrofoam and then compresses out air to make blocks of densified foam. The process reduces the volume of the foam by 1/50th of its original volume, allowing it to be used for things like insulation and picture frames.

“It's exciting that we have the only community densifier in Central Ohio,” Dew said.

The ESC plans to host regular Styrofoam drop-off events open to residents, the general public, and local businesses.

“Over time we hope to increase the number of collections, as well as form strong partnerships with surrounding communities,” Hosni said. “This project presents a unique opportunity to expand foam recycling services for not only residents of Hilliard but also other areas of Central Ohio.”

Styrofoam drop-off events began this fall, with future events to be posted on the City's website and social media pages.

SNOW WARRIORS

READY
FOR A
FLURRY
OF
ACTIVITY

It's 3 a.m. on a frigid January morning in Hilliard, and 12 City employees get the call to prepare for significant snow and ice removal during an upcoming storm.

For the next 12 hours, they'll put everything else on hold to ensure the roads are clear and safe for the public. These "snow warriors" are public works first responders, working behind-the-scenes with a heart for service to their community.

"Not everyone is cut out for public works," said Larry Lester, Operations Director. "Our team members make themselves available and sacrifice family and recreational time, knowing that when the phone rings, it's time to mobilize and get things done."

Lester leads a team of 38 people in Operations, with 28 Maintenance Technicians who are responsible for plowing 130 center-line miles and 300-lane miles within the City's corporate limits.

Snow and ice control is a three-step process – planning, staging, and mobilization – that starts well before any precipitation hits the ground.

"We house about 2,400 tons of salt and 15,000 gallons of brine, which we fill in the summer to last us through a typical winter season," Lester said. "We have around 40 City trucks we can send out that are prepped days before a storm hits."

According to the City's Snow and Ice Control Plan, the priority of service starts with major arterial roads, followed by minor arterials, then secondary streets, cul-de-sacs and alleys, and – finally – parking lots, sidewalks, and City buildings.

“We pride ourselves in our quick response time,” Lester said. “We can mobilize a crew for a staged shift in about an hour and have drivers in, trucks started, ready to go within that time.”

The City is divided into four quadrants for the purpose of snow and ice control, which helps prioritize need in different areas. Supervisors and crew leaders go out for “spotting” to monitor variations in road conditions and assess their needs.

“Road conditions may vary from one quadrant to the other, and we're always trying to be as efficient as possible,” Lester said. “We're also implementing surface temperature sensors on our trucks that will help us strategize even more in the future.”

On average, the City responds to around 12 to 15 snow and ice events a year, with about half of those being measurable accumulation. Lester said the use of technology and weather apps aid in preparation, but with the unpredictable nature of winter storms, it's often “all-hands-on-deck” on any given day.

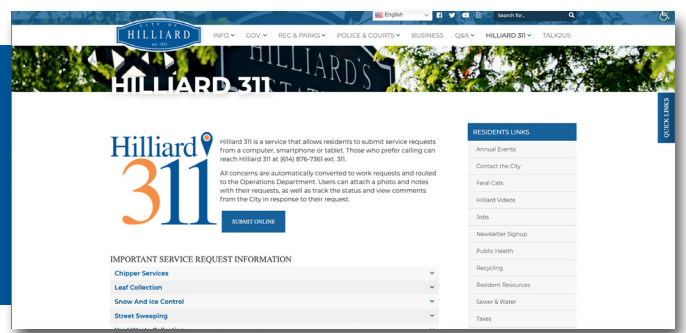
“When it's time to respond to any emergency, we drop everything we're doing and respond,” Lester said. “Our people come in and work continuously in rotating 12-hour shifts until the roads are clear and safe. Then, we can send them home.”

Lester expects a harsher winter compared to recent years. He says his entire team of “snow warriors” considers it an honor to serve their community in this way.

“We have talented people on our team who respond to so many things, and it comes down to being flexible, resourceful, adaptable, and willing to jump in anytime the need is there,” Lester said.

Residents can now track Hilliard's 11 snow plows online through a new fleet tracking software. The system uses GIS technology to track the City's snow plows, pickup trucks, leaf vacuums, and chipper trucks.

HILLIARD SENIORS SEW THEIR

HEARTS

INTO BLANKETS FOR NICU BABIES

Five years ago, Elke Lester and Mickey Bigbie decided to use their love of sewing to provide comfort to infants in the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU). Today, the pair has provided more than 600 blankets, each with a signature “heart” logo, to babies and their families.

Lester and Bigbie have been members at the Hilliard Senior Center’s craft club for a few years, where attendees meet weekly to enjoy crafts and camaraderie. Then, they heard there was a need for blankets at Nationwide Children’s Hospital.

“The neighbor of another member told us that Children’s Hospital needed baby blankets, and that’s how it all started,” Lester said.

At the time, members of the craft club were focused on knitting and crocheting projects, but Lester and Bigbie decided to begin sewing small baby blankets with materials they had collected over the years.

“I’m a collector of fabric, so I had a lot,” Lester said.

To be accepted by the hospital, each blanket donated must be crib size and made with cotton on top and a fleece layer on the bottom. At the NICU, the quilts are draped over the babies’ isolettes, providing safety from bright lights in the unit and a sound barrier from the machines.

While Lester does most of the sewing, Bigbie does the tacking, which prevents the blanket layers from separating in the wash. Each blanket has its own style and look, but hospital staff can always identify which blankets were made by Lester and Bigbie from the heart stitched in the corner.

“We hear that the nurses are so excited to pick out their favorite blankets for the babies under their care,” Bigbie said. “When the baby leaves the hospital, the blanket is sent with their family.”

Lester, Bigbie, and other members of the craft group have also made and donated knitted hats, booties, and small pieces of fabric used to wrap equipment to make it more comfortable for the baby.

“We make sure every piece of fabric is used, even the scraps,” Bigbie said.

While the duo has never seen or met any of the NICU families they’ve impacted, it means a lot to them.

“I have three children of my own and none were ever hospitalized. I can’t imagine how traumatic of an experience it is for them,” Lester said. “We hope parents

who have a newborn in the hospital realize that strangers are there for them. We care.”

Q&A With HPD's Future Chief

Hilliard's Deputy Chief of Police Michael Woods is no stranger to interviews. As a seasoned law enforcement leader with decades of experience, much has been written about the man who took on HPD's number two spot (known as the "DC") in September. But, did you know he got his professional start fixing breakfast at Wendy's, is a proud #GirlDad to triplets, and a perfectionist when it comes to home landscaping? We sat down with DC Woods to learn more about the man slated to be Hilliard's next police chief.

You're in an elevator with a stranger. What do you tell them about yourself? I'm a Columbus guy – born and raised — and graduated from Franklin Heights High School. I grew up with four sisters and am married with three daughters, so I'm used to being around women.

Tell us about your family My wife, Dana, and I have been part of the Hilliard community for 26 years (married for 28). Our daughters attended St. Brendan's and graduated from Bishop Ready High School. The girls are now 23.

What was your first job? The Wendy's on Stringtown Road making breakfast. I worked the early shift in the 1980s and made omelets.

Has anyone ever compared you to a celebrity? Lou Ferrigno (The Hulk) and Harry Connick Jr. But I don't think so.

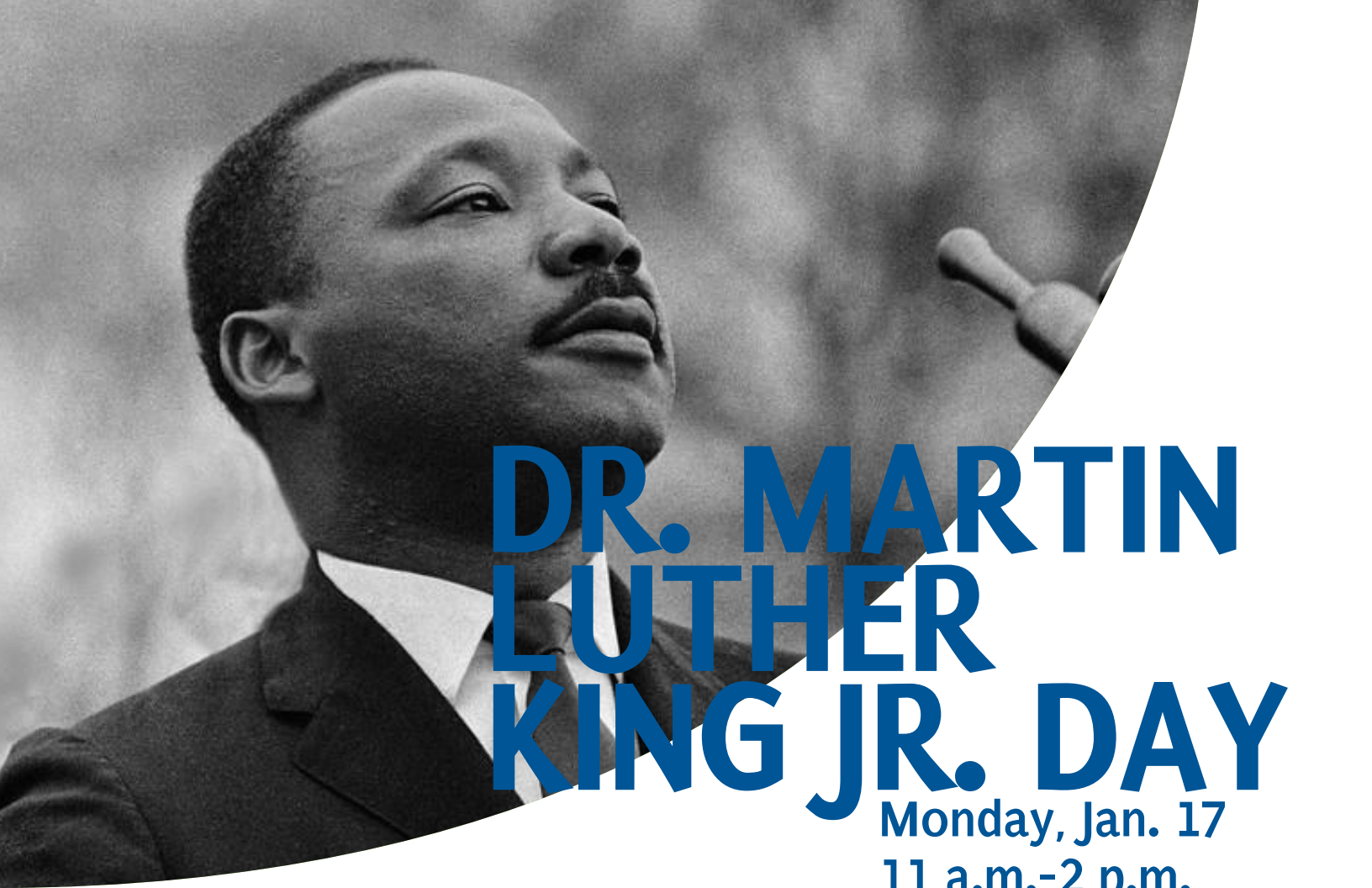
Who's your role model? My dad.

Big Things Are Coming To Recreation and Parks Starting in 2022!

Thank you, City of Hilliard voters, for supporting Issue 22! Your support will change Hilliard Recreation and Parks – and, in many ways, our community!

On Nov. 2, our residents passed the ballot initiative, creating a permanent funding source for City of Hilliard Recreation and Parks.

The high-profile project that will come from Issue 22 will be construction of a modern community center on about 150 acres of parkland to be developed just west of Municipal Park. The goal is for the center to open in 2024:

2022 The City will continue gathering community feedback about the community center and will begin the design phase of the project.

2023 Groundbreaking will occur and construction will begin on the center.

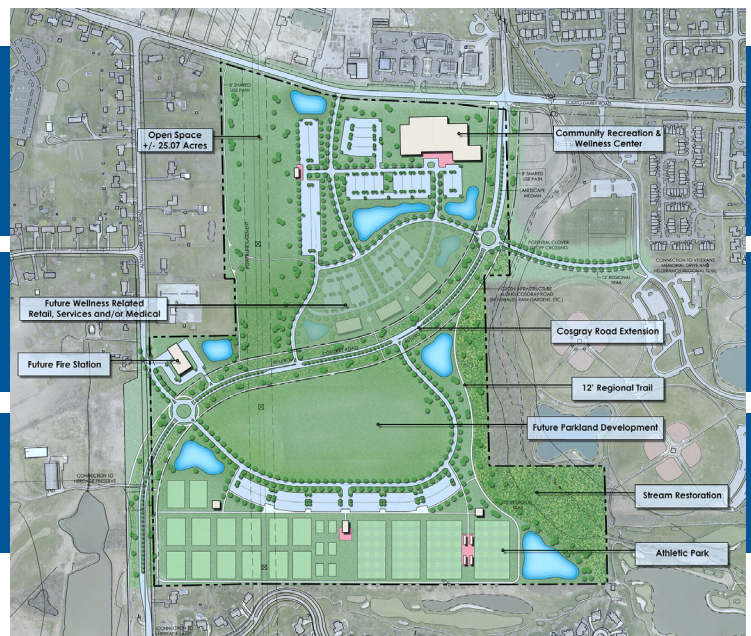
2024 Construction will be completed and the center will open, probably in late 2024.

Residents will help us determine the amenities in this community center, but we know it will include such great things as an indoor aquatics center, modern fitness facilities, flexible gymnasium spaces, classroom spaces for expanded programming for all ages, and a new senior center.

But the revenue the City of Hilliard receives thanks to your support will also mean more trails in our community, additional athletic fields, new parks, and other great amenities.

In 2022, watch for completion of the playground project at Lakewood Park, the completion of several projects at Father DePietro Park, and paving improvements in Municipal Park – all thanks to funding from Issue 22.

“Part of the promise the City makes when asking the community to entrust it with tax funds is that our residents will be part of the process of deciding how that money is spent. We also must promise to report back to the community about those investments,” said City Manager



Michelle Crandall. “Residents will be included in the process of planning the future community center, as well as other future parks and recreation projects. We look forward to sharing the progress with our community as we make these improvements!”

Go to hilliardohio.gov/registration and click the “Register” button.

If you are new to Hilliard Recreation and Parks, you must establish a RecTrac account. Within 72 business hours, our staff will verify your residency and activate your account. During this process, patrons will create their own username and password if setting up their account online. RecTrac will automatically create a username and password for patrons setting up accounts in person at the Community Center.

Recreation Camp

Camp activities will include outdoor group games, sports, arts and crafts, nature, science experiments, and swimming at the Hilliard Family Aquatic Center. All camp activities occur from 9 a.m. - 4 p.m., with “before camp” at 7:30 a.m. and “after camp” until 5:30 p.m.

See our website at hilliardohio.gov for more information. Campers must be ages 5 ½ to 11 and have completed kindergarten through fifth grade.

Fair Share

The Recreation and Parks Department is largely financed through taxes paid by individuals living or working within Hilliard city boundaries. For that reason, we verify residency annually. Those who are unable to verify that they live or work within Hilliard city boundaries must pay a higher fee. We also delay activating pool memberships until verification of residency or employment is provided. We accept proof of residency or employment in person at our Community Center during normal business hours; via mail at Hilliard Community Center, 3800 Veterans Memorial Drive, Hilliard, Ohio 43026; or by email at recandparks@hilliardohio.gov.

City Residents (R) receive the lowest rates. Having a Hilliard mailing address or attending Hilliard City Schools does not necessarily mean you live within city boundaries. We verify residency each year on the Franklin County Auditor’s website. Renters must provide (in person or via email) a utility bill, government-issued ID, or other proof of residency.

Non-Residents Paying Hilliard Income Taxes

also receive the resident rate. To prove employment, you must provide a valid government-issued ID and one of the following each year:

- A pay stub from the previous 30 days that includes the employee’s full name and current address.
- Proof of employment on company letterhead with the signature of the patron’s supervisor or company president.

School District/Non-Residents (NR) are those who neither live nor work within Hilliard city boundaries. These individuals pay a higher fee.

Military Discount

We offer a 10-percent discount for active duty and veteran military personnel and their immediate families for pool memberships, rentals, and activities. This excludes third-party organizations and daily pool admission. Military ID must be provided in person to receive the discount.

POLICIES

Inclement Weather

In the event of inclement weather, Hilliard Recreation and Parks Department may close facilities or cancel/delay any program, special event, or drop-in activity. This decision is made for the safety of our patrons based upon the severity of roads and weather.

To get the most up-to-date cancellation information, follow our Facebook and Twitter pages, visit hilliardohio.gov, or call (614) 334-2598. This line is updated daily with changes, closures and cancellations of special events, aquatics, sports, and programs.

Programs Scheduled Before 5 p.m.

Programs/activities are canceled when Hilliard City School District closes or is on a delay due to inclement weather.

Programs Scheduled After 5 p.m.

Program cancellation after 5 p.m. is determined by 4 p.m. the day of the activity on weekdays.

Weekends

Cancellation is determined by 9 a.m. for Saturday and Sunday programs.

Full Refunds

Recreation and Parks Services

A full refund will be issued in the event of insufficient program enrollment for Recreation and Parks programs. Additionally, park/facility visitors or participants of activities planned and implemented by the City will be granted a full refund if the patron is not satisfied with the service rendered. Refund requests must be submitted in writing and indicate the reason or cause of dissatisfaction. No refunds are issued for pool memberships.

Senior Programs

A full refund is issued if registration is cancelled before the posted deadline. Refunds less than \$10 are automatically credited to your household account. Trip registrations cancelled after the posted deadline are not eligible for refunds unless there is a waiting list and someone can take your place.

Services by Independent Contractors

Refunds will be made according to the individual contractor's agreement.

Partial Refunds

A 10-percent service charge will be applied to refund requests for programs and/or services not yet rendered. For example, if patrons register for a program and later

determine they are no longer interested, have a schedule conflict, or cannot participate for some other reason, they must submit a written request for a refund at least ten (10) days before the service date, activity, or first class of an instructional session.

Refunds will generally not be granted for requests with less than ten (10) days before the first session.

In unusual situations (patron is relocating, has an illness, becomes physically unable to continue program, etc.) where a refund is requested for services that have been paid in advance, the balance of the remaining value will be refunded after receipt of a written request.

COVID Safety Protocols

The City of Hilliard's top priority is the safety of our participants. Therefore, at the time of class registration or arrival, all participants must sign a COVID user agreement. The circumstances with COVID-19 are changing daily; therefore, guidelines are regularly modified and updated.

Our number one priority is to keep participants and staff safe. Participants should practice the following guidelines:

- Stay home if you are ill.
- Wash your hands often.

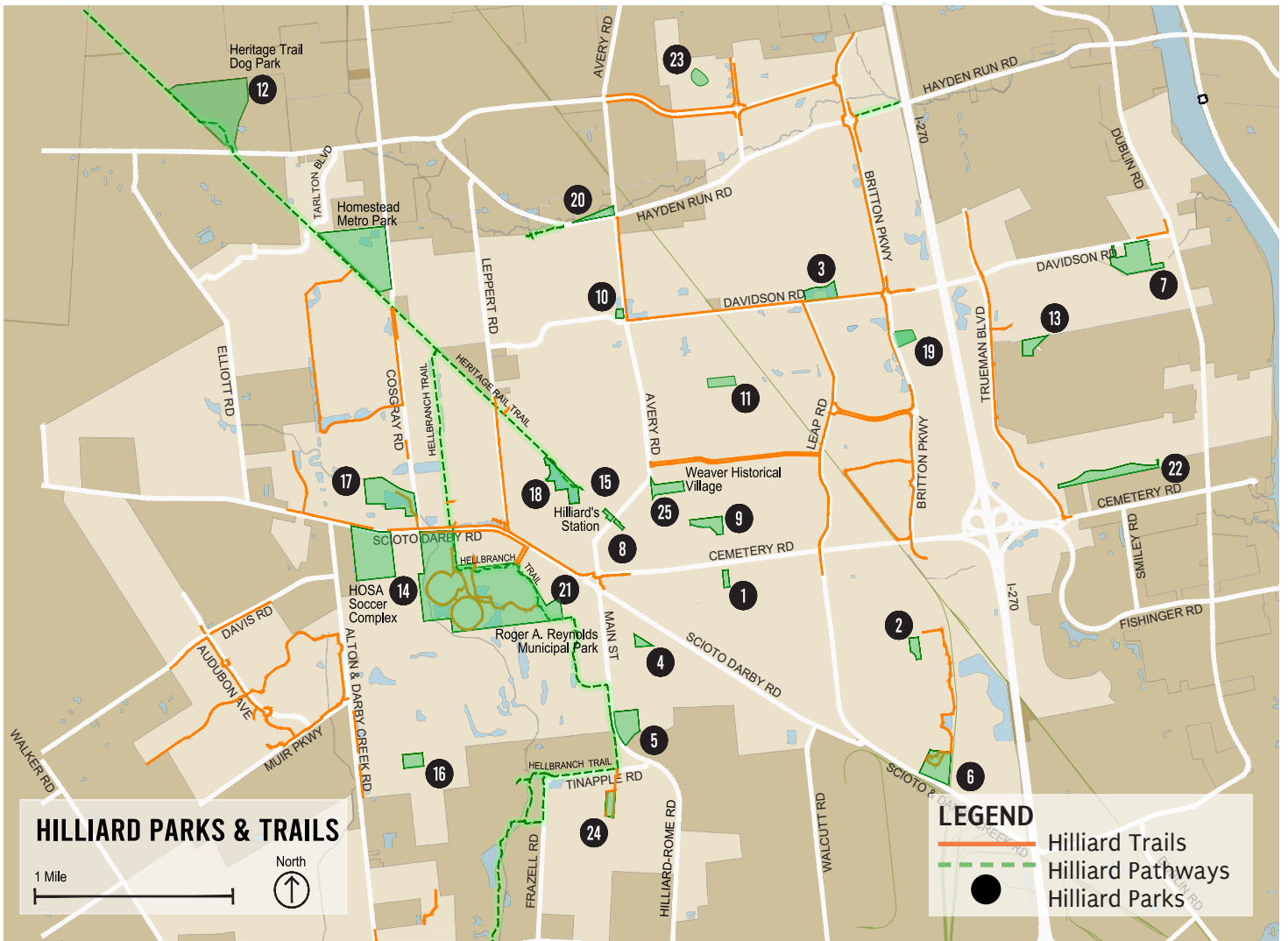

AQUATICS

Hilliard operates two municipal pools: the Hilliard Family Aquatic Center and the Clyde “Butch” Seidle Community Pool. In addition to providing a safe space for families to play and spend time together, the municipal pools also organize swimming lessons and events for community members of all ages.

The outdoor pools are seasonal outdoor facilities. Pool memberships are valid at both locations. Both facilities open to the public Saturday, May 28.

Our number one priority is safety, which includes having the required number of lifeguards necessary for us to operate. For that reason, the Hilliard Family Aquatic Center’s last day of operation for the season is Tuesday, Aug. 16. Lifeguard staff availability is reduced significantly beginning Aug. 17, the first day of the school year for Hilliard City Schools. Remaining staff works at the Clyde “Butch” Seidle Community Pool through Labor Day.

Our finalized pool hours for Aug. 17-Sept. 5 will be posted online and at both pools by early August.

Pool passes are valid at both locations. Key fobs allowing admission are mailed to new members and to those members who buy add-on passes for the first time. Membership key fobs/add-on passes are not re-issued each year. Keep key fobs from season to season to avoid paying a \$5 replacement fee. All members must present key fobs at the gate or use the key ring app to enter either facility. Otherwise, members must pay the daily admission.

2022 memberships go on sale starting Jan. 3. Membership forms are processed as soon as possible after they are received. Staff verifies residency for all applications within 72 business hours with Franklin County Auditor's Office. There is a limit of two adults (age 21 and up) per membership. Both adults must live at the same address.

RECYCLE RIGHT

Annually, Franklin County residents and businesses send more than a million tons of material to the Franklin County Landfill. Even more surprising is that nearly 76% of all the material in the landfill could have been recycled or composted.

It's not enough just to recycle. It's also important to recycle right. In Franklin County, there are five material types that are currently accepted for household recycling.



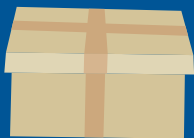
