MEET THE CITY'S MOST TENURED PUBLIC SERVANTS

It's difficult to picture what Hilliard looked like in the 1980s, seeing how large the community is today. However, the three most tenured City employees remember like it was yesterday.

These three employees have collectively served the Hilliard community for nearly 100 years. Their roots and passion for this community run deep.

Operations Administrator Dave Dale is the longestserving employee at the City with 35 years of service. His career with the City started in high school doing odd jobs. After graduating high school and serving in the Navy, he returned to Hilliard at age 26 in the Operations Department working on streets, sewers, hydrants, traffic lights, and streetlights. He has worked under three different mayors, one city manager, and eight different department directors.

One of Dale's earliest memories is plowing the streets of Hilliard as a 17-year-old during the infamous Blizzard of '78. Starting his career as a maintenance technician, he transitioned to a supervisor role as a crew leader in 1999. In 2017, Dale was promoted to operations administrator and assists in overseeing the entire Operations Department.

When he first started with the City in 1977, the work environment was much different than it is today. "The antiquated equipment we had was often broken. We made the best of what resources we had to fix problems for residents," Dale recalled.

The employees are what Dale appreciates most about working at the City. "When things need done here, we get them done," he said, complimenting his staff on snow and leaf removal efficiency.

Dale's advice for current and future employees is simple: "Everybody has a story that is important to them. When interacting with residents' major issues, you must have sympathy, patience, and understanding."

Operations Crew Leader Mike Carroll also was raised in Hilliard and worked at the Community Center during high school, setting up events and programs. He remembers several late nights cleaning up after programs and just sleeping at the Community Center overnight to walk across the street to Hilliard High School the next morning. After graduation, Carroll returned to the Recreation and Parks Department, doing maintenance on ballfields and parks. He even started the first co-ed softball, volleyball, and basketball leagues.

Carroll describes Hilliard in his early years as a quiet little town. "Hilliard was like Mayberry. Everyone knew each other. It was a tight-knit community."

There have been many changes during his 31 years of service, and Carroll enjoys watching the City grow. Currently, Carroll oversees traffic signal, streetlight, street, and right-of-way maintenance. He appreciates the City's upgraded equipment and technology to keep up with increased departmental demands.

Carroll has one simple piece of advice for current and future employees: "Take pride in your work. You are a public servant. Remember that."

Officer Ron Burkitt has served Hilliard for 32 years. He served as a high school resource officer from 2001-2015, spending 13 years at Davidson High School and two years at Bradley High School.

Burkitt remembers growing up in Hilliard when there were only six housing developments – quite different from Hilliard today.

Burkitt's roots in Hilliard are deep, as several close family members still live in the community. His father (see story on page 6) lives in the house Burkitt grew up in and even ran for mayor years ago.

Burkitt loved the Hilliard community so much, he chose to serve it. After beginning his career with the Hilliard Division of Police, he founded the bicycle unit and became the bicycle instructor. He has many good memories of working Independence Day celebrations in Hilliard on the bicycle over the years.

He's thankful to the Hilliard community and their support and appreciation over his years. "If you can make one person's day better, you've done your job as an officer. This job isn't about you, it's about serving the public to the best of your ability."

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Real People, Real Possibilities

Paul Burkitt has taken a front row seat to the evolution and growth of Hilliard during the past 45 years. He moved his family here in 1977 and never left, raising five children with his late wife, Beverly.

Some may recognize Burkitt as a former Hilliard City Council member from 1982-1990. Shortly after, he ran for mayor against Roger A. Reynolds in a hotly contested race, which saw Burkitt falling short by a mere 500 votes.

"I still think about that mayoral race from time-to-time. With the help of my wife, we ran a really good campaign," Burkitt said. "But everything happens for a reason, and I've been able to impact the Hilliard community in my own way through the senior center and other programs."

Burkitt turns 91 this year. He is one of the longest-tenured members of the Hilliard Senior Center and "Happiness Club," the center's primary fundraising organization. After retiring from Battelle in 1993 with 40 years of service as a clerk and business manager, Burkitt has stayed active. He's been a member of numerous clubs and organizations and was inducted into the Hilliard Senior Citizens Hall of Fame in 2006.

"I think I've served as treasurer of every group I've been in," Burkitt joked. "But I wasn't one to join a club just to be a member. I wanted to contribute."

Looking back on the past nine decades, Burkitt has lived a full and well-rounded life. Growing up in Madison County, he graduated from Mount Sterling High School and later served in the Army during the Korean War. He married his high school sweetheart, Beverly, in 1951.

Burkitt is also a longtime member of the Hilliard United Methodist Church and volunteered countless hours as chairman of various committees. He watched his five children graduate from Hilliard High School, including his youngest, Ron Burkitt (see story on page 4), who's served with the Hilliard Division of Police for more than 30 years.

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"It's been a lifetime of memories," Burkitt said. "Hilliard has seen a lot of changes since we first moved here, but the recent economic development has been a change for the better."

Burkitt is also an accomplished horseshoe pitcher, and the Paul Burkitt Courts in Municipal Park were named for him. He helped form the Hilliard Horseshoe Club in 1978 and is the last surviving charter member. Burkitt has traveled around the country competing in tournaments and, in 2006, was inducted into the Ohio State Horseshoe Pitcher Hall of Fame. He even brought home a world championship in 2011 in an elder's class for those 70 and older.

"I love the exercise and camaraderie of playing horseshoes," said Burkitt, who still maintains the courts by mowing the grass every week. "We're always looking for more people to play in our league, which starts in the middle of May and runs for 12 weeks. It doesn't matter how good you are, it's all about having fun!"

On any given day, you'll see Burkitt still doing just that – having fun at the senior center or with his growing family. He's a grandfather to 12 grandkids and nine greatgrandkids, and attributes his longevity to "eating fairly healthy and staying active."

"Hilliard has been a great place to live and raise a family," Burkitt said. "My advice to younger people is to try new things and get involved with your community. Some things you think you can't do until you try them, and then you find out otherwise."

In 1978, Burkitt helped establish the "Hilliard Iron Tossers," who later changed their name to the "Hilliard Horseshoe Club." To this day, Burkitt is one of their most accomplished pitchers, winning two Ohio state championships and a world championship. In 2015, the horseshoe courts at Roger A. Reynolds Municipal Park were officially named the "Paul Burkitt Courts."

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There are unmistakable signs that summer is flowing into fall. The lush greens of June and July are morphing into autumnal shades, and for those who crave it, pumpkin spice season is just around the corner!

At Destination Hilliard, we know fall means a bit of a scaling back for family travel. In exchange, the transitioning seasons create a whole new set of opportunities to enjoy the events and opportunities in this community.

Happening in Hilliard

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Hilliard has numerous family-friendly events between September and the end of the year.

The three big events are Old Hilliardfest, the City of Hilliard's Fall Festival, and December's Tree Lighting.

Old Hilliardfest Art and Street Fair (Sept. 10) takes place in Downtown Hilliard on Main Street. The main festival takes place throughout the day, featuring live music, great food, kids' games and jumpies, carnival rides, a sunflower show, a car show, a Kid's Fair, and various local businesses and organizations.

Fall Festival (1-4 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 18) brings the best of the season to Municipal Park. You want hay wagon rides? Kids' inflatables? Animals? Chalk art? Pumpkin carving? Food trucks? Homestead games? Fall Festival offers all that and more!

The Tree Lighting (4-6:30 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 4) serves as the unofficial end of fall and the start of the winter holidays! There are so many activities, they can't be contained in one park, so the City hosts it in two! Between Hilliard's Station Park and Weaver Park, the event includes children's

activities, musical entertainment, mini train and horse-and-carriage rides, ice carving, food, and – of course – visits with Santa. It all wraps up with the tree lighting and the start of the holiday season!

Come out for other events, too, including Beggar's Night (6-8 p.m. Oct. 31) and the Watch and Glow pumpkin float and movie in Municipal Park (6:30-9:30 p.m. Oct. 15.) And if you want to get into the spirit of fall, consider attending the Hilliard Marching Band Invitational Sept. 10 at Bradley High School.

Fall Fun in Hilliard

There is a lot of fall fun in the community outside of special events, of course.

Earlier this year, the City of Hilliard approved year-round status for the downtown's Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area, meaning you can join your friends and neighbors for some adult beverages and great food on these warm fall days and crisp nights.

And remember to get your fill of fall food! Local shops like New Grounds Coffee House, REV Coffee House, Daylight Donuts, and the Lil Donut Factory, and frozen treat stores like Rita's, Little Ice Cream Shoppe, Whit's, and Graeter's all bring out autumnal flavors to appease your palate.

Or, maybe you'd just like to enjoy the changing colors of the season. There's no better time of year to take the family on a bike ride on the Heritage Trail, starting and finishing with some bubble tea at Bee Bubbly (4013 Main St.) or some food at any of the great restaurants at Center Street Market (5354 Center St.) and on Main Street. (Personally, we love the plantains at Starliner Diner, 4121 Main St.)

AMY VAN HUFFEL PROGRAMS HILLIARD SENIORS' ACTIVE LIVES

The Hilliard Senior Center is among the busiest and most well-attended in Central Ohio, and Amy Van Huffel is at the heart of it all. She's overseen steady growth as the Recreation Supervisor of Adult and Senior Programming since taking over the role in August 2020.

"My goal coming in was to offer more active programs and be able to engage younger seniors," Van Huffel said. "We start taking memberships at age 55, and those Baby Boomers are much more active than they've ever been for that age group."

Van Huffel grew up in Northeast Ohio, attending Warren JFK High School, where she developed her love for sports and the outdoors. She went on to major in sport management at Bowling Green State University and earned her master's in recreation and leisure studies from the University of Toledo. After working for municipalities in Michigan and, more recently, Groveport, she accepted the job with the City of Hilliard.

"A big reason I wanted to get in this type of senior-specific role is that you have a set audience you're serving every day, and you're able to develop better connections because of it," Van Huffel said. "My favorite part of the job is building those relationships."

Even through the pandemic, the Hilliard Senior Center was able to accommodate a record number of older adults. In 2021, the City served 37 percent more seniors than ever before, offering a wide variety of meals, activities, and trips with an affordable annual membership fee of just \$15. The senior center currently has around 900 members; 52 percent of those members are non-Hilliard residents.

"I think some people think senior centers are boring, and that's not it at all," Van Huffel said.

Van Huffel leads regular hikes and bike rides. She said there's more than 30 activities offered on any given month, not including day trips. Plus, senior lunches offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays are a huge success, with a daily average of 60 to 80 meals served.

Hilliard Express, the City's free senior transportation service, has also seen a steady ridership increase. The City is in the process of buying one of the two vehicles to significantly cut down operating costs.

"Our job is to improve our senior residents' quality of life," Van Huffel said. "People are here to have fun. We work so you can play."

Serving up ice, custard, and happiness is a family affair in the City of Hilliard.

It was a long-time dream for mother-daughter duo Jan and Jillian Bell, who operate the Rita's Italian Ice at 5254 Franklin St.

"We definitely wanted our store to be in Hilliard," said Jan, who first began the exploration of owning a Rita's Italian Ice 15 years ago. "My parents grew up here, and we loved living in Hilliard and being involved in the community."

Jan looked at several locations before choosing a new commercial space near Landmark Lofts. The store, which overlooks Cemetery Road, is just a short walk from the vibrancy of Downtown Hilliard. They've been scooping treats there since August 2019.

Rita's offers 85 flavors of Italian ice, 50 flavors of frozen custard, and countless variations, including the Gelati (layers of Italian ice and custard), Blendini, Concrete, Misto Shake, and Custard Cookie Sandwich.

The most popular item nationally is the Mango Gelati, but Hilliard locals can't get enough of the Cotton Candy Gelati.

"There really is something for everyone," said Jillian, who prefers a Reese's Peanut Butter Mudslide Concrete. Jan's favorite item is Chocolate Chocolate-Chip Hand-Scooped Custard.

Jillian, a 2013 graduate of Hilliard Bradley High School, was initially working part-time — but Jan took note when her 23-year-old daughter earned a perfect score on a franchise ownership training test. In 2021, Jillian joined the business full-time as the manager.

Jillian focuses on day-to-day operations, such as making homemade custard and Italian ice, baking waffle cones, supervising staff, and posting to social media. Jan handles the paperwork side, which includes payroll and communicating with corporate.

"We get along well," said Jan. "We know what we expect of the store and each other."

During the busy summer months Rita's employs about 20 community members. The business is also a regular sponsor of City of Hilliard summer events, providing free samples at Sprout's Night Out, Celebration at the Station, and National Night Out, among others.

When business slows down in the winter, Jan and Jillian are back in the kitchen together, doing dishes, ordering supplies, and serving up treats to customers.

"We try to be welcoming and give everyone a little happiness," said Jillian. "We're a family business, so we enjoy helping families have a little break from the stresses in their lives."

FESTA ESL GIVES VOICE TO ALL GENERATIONS

On the first floor of the Upper Arlington Lutheran Church at Mill Run just west of Hilliard, children from more than a dozen nationalities gather around tables, chattering in various languages while enjoying a snack of nutritious yogurt.

Meanwhile, on the second floor, their parents sit in a semicircle of classroom tables, learning nuances of the English language in immersive discussions with teachers and volunteers.

"Everything we're trying to teach the littles, the adults are learning, too," says Kim Emch, founder and executive director of Festa, which has offered the agency's threegeneration English as a Second Language program since 2009. "These parents know that their children learning English is their best chance to get the next generation out of poverty."

The multi-generational nature of the Festa ESL program is what sets it apart from similar programs. Festa's ESL – which serves more than 600 people who speak approximately 45 different languages – focuses on the whole family, teaching children, teenagers, and parents English.

"That's really the most significant and impactful way to do ESL, in my opinion," Emch said. "When you just teach adults, what you end up doing is just teaching one adult in the family – and it's usually the male. The female stays at home tending to the children and ends up trying to learn English by watching TV."

Festa (which was previously known as SON Ministries) started the ESL program a few years after starting as a summer lunch program in 2007. While dealing with the pressing issue of food insecurity for children when free and reduced school lunches are not available, Emch discovered that the language barrier was another significant foundational problem for many families.

"They said that their children were falling behind in school year after year because of the parents' lack of English, lack of knowledge, their work schedules, and lack of technology in their homes," Emch said. "They know education is their children's way out of poverty. So they asked, 'Could you help us with after-school tutoring homework help?"

SON Ministries began offering tutoring in January 2008. By the fall of 2009, that had expanded to include ESL classes for children. It wasn't long before the program evolved into its full-family approach. Today, Festa's ESL program employs 10 full-time staff, 50 seasonal staff, and nearly 280 volunteers annually.

The ESL program also changes the lives of the volunteers and staff.

"When a volunteer comes here and gets to meet people from 45 countries, they're changed for the better," she said. "It breaks down stereotypes. It breaks down misgivings, hatred and prejudice. Now you know a person and you care about them. This is a critical piece of our ministry."

Emch said most people want to make a difference. They're just waiting for someone to show them how. "I love being able to say, 'Whether you are 7 or 77, you can make a difference – right here, tomorrow night, and I can show you exactly how. You'll feel certain you made a difference in another person's life.' Who doesn't want that?" Emch credits much of the success of the program to her faith.

"It's like a piece of metal to a magnet," she said. "I couldn't stop doing this today, and there are days that are hard and frustrating. And I think, 'God, is there somebody better than me that should be doing this? Why do you have me doing this? I'll find someone better.' As of now, He doesn't release me. This is definitely a call on my life."

Program Gives Teens Leadership Experience

During the past few years, Hilliard Recreation and Parks Department has added more summer programming, events, and partnerships to its list of offerings for young people. However, staff noticed it could be difficult to develop programs that resonate with teenagers.

That's why the Hilliard Leadership Corps program was born.

"We wanted to find ways to get young people involved in what we were doing," said City of Hilliard Recreation and Parks Deputy Director Erin Duffee. "It became clear that the most effective ways to reach them would be through volunteer and job opportunities."

Staff began considering ways to help teenagers meet new volunteer requirements set by the Ohio Department of Education. "If they were engaged with a volunteer opportunity, maybe they would get a better understanding of recreation and parks and become better stewards of their community," Duffee said.

The Recreation and Parks Department quickly connected with Festa, a local faith-based organization that builds relationships and provides services for low-income families. (See related story, page 12.) Every summer, Festa offers a "summer lunch camp" to children who receive free or reduced-price lunch at school while providing a safe place to learn and grow.

"Getting involved in Festa's summer camp was a perfect way to launch Hilliard Leadership Corps," Duffee said.

When it was time to find the teens, staff reached out to



Hilliard City School District to recruit athletes, which helped spread the word among students.

"Before we knew it, we had 36 applicants! That's amazing for a first-year program," Duffee said.

The first batch of Hilliard Leadership Corps students were placed with Festa's summer camp, but also given seasonal job opportunities within the Recreation and Parks Department. Staff provided them with leadership training, "supply kits" full of recreation ideas for children, teambuilding trainings, and more. Parks employees also worked on ways to give students valuable skills such as résumé writing and leadership training.

"It was basically a mini leadership training to prepare them to be camp counselors," Duffee said. "We tried to match each student with opportunities that were of interest to them."

Ayomide Ayorinde, a senior at Hilliard Davidson High School who is interested in pediatric dentistry, participated in Hilliard Leadership Corps last summer to gain experience with youths.

"I came in nervous, but with the help of staff I gained confidence and many new skills," she said.

As a counselor, Ayorinde and her peers were tasked with providing entertainment, education, and emotional support to children at Festa's summer lunch camp.

"We created games, lesson plans, and – most importantly – made sure the kids felt comfortable," Ayorinde said.

Through the tools she learned at Hilliard Leadership Corps training, Ayorinde said she was able to better connect with campers.

"This kid was having a rough day – I could tell by his behavior – so I decided to talk to him. Since he was comfortable with me, I was able to give him advice that helped. Making him feel better made me feel happy," she said.

Ayorinde said the program has gained popularity among teens at Hilliard Davidson High School.

"I know some of my friends applied this year after hearing about my positive experience," she said.

Duffee agrees that Hilliard Leadership Corps has been a success, making a difference in the lives of teens and children in the community.

"When young people participate in leadership opportunities, you can see the sense of pride it gives them," Duffee said. "All students can benefit from this program."

The Recreation and Parks Department is largely financed through taxes paid by individuals living or working within Hilliard city boundaries. For that reason, we verify residency annually. Those who are unable to verify that they live or work within Hilliard city boundaries must pay a higher fee. We also delay activating pool memberships until verification of residency or employment is provided. We accept proof of residency or employment in person at our Community Center during normal business hours; via mail at Hilliard Community Center, 3800 Veterans Memorial Drive, Hilliard, Ohio 43026; or by email at *recandparks@hilliardohio.gov*.

City Residents (R) receive the lowest rates. Having a Hilliard mailing address or attending Hilliard City Schools does not necessarily mean you live within city boundaries. We verify residency each year on the Franklin County

Auditor's website. Renters must provide (in person or via email) a utility bill, government-issued ID, or other proof of residency.

Non-Residents Paying Hilliard Income Taxes also receive the resident rate. To prove employment, you must provide a valid government-issued ID and one of the following each year:

- A pay stub from the previous 30 days that includes the employee's full name and current address.
- Proof of employment on company letterhead with the signature of the patron's supervisor or company president.

School District/Non-Residents (NR) are those who neither live nor work within Hilliard city boundaries. These individuals pay a higher fee.

Military Discount

We offer a 10-percent discount for active duty and veteran military personnel and their immediate families for pool memberships, rentals, and activities. This excludes thirdparty organizations and daily pool admission. Military ID must be provided in person to receive the discount.

Inclement Weather

In the event of inclement weather, Hilliard Recreation and Parks Department may close facilities or cancel/delay any program, special event, or drop-in activity. This decision is made for the safety of our patrons based upon the severity of roads and weather.

Programs Scheduled Before 5 p.m.

Programs/activities are canceled when Hilliard City School District closes or is on a delay due to inclement weather.

Programs Scheduled After 5 p.m.

Program cancellation after 5 p.m. is determined by 4 p.m. the day of the activity on weekdays.

Weekends

Cancellation is determined by 9 a.m. for Saturday and Sunday programs.



Refunds

Low Enrollment

If a program/class does not meet the minimum requirement of students, the class will be canceled and a full refund will be issued to those enrolled.

General Recreation Program

Any cancellation or request for a refund prior to 10 days of the start of the program/class will result in a full refund. If a cancellation or refund request is needed within the 10day window of that program/class starting, a 10 percent processing fee will be charged. If the cancellation drops the program/class below the minimum student enrollment, a refund will not be issued.

Senior Programs

A full refund is issued if registration is canceled before the posted deadline. Refunds less than \$10 are automatically

credited to your household account. Trip registrations canceled after the posted deadline are not eligible for refunds unless there is a waiting list and someone is able to take your place.

COVID Safety Protocols

The City of Hilliard's top priority is the safety of our participants. At the time of class registration or arrival, all participants must sign a COVID user agreement. Guidelines are regularly modified and updated. Participants should practice the following guidelines:

- Stay home if you are ill.



Hilliard's Station Park

Architectural features of the two buildings reflect the site's past use as a train depot.




