



The ‘Village Movement’ is Coming to Hilliard



In May 2022, the City of Hilliard created an Aging in Place Committee charged with developing ways to make Hilliard a place where older citizens can age in place within their homes and in the community.

As a result, the committee determined that implementing a Village model would be the best way to meet these goals and improve quality of life for older adults in Hilliard.

The Village model originated in Boston and has grown into a national approach to providing a range of practical support services and social connections for older adults through a locally organized non-profit. A Village helps older adults enjoy a rich, independent, and healthy quality of life when they choose to age in their homes and communities.

Home in Hilliard

In Hilliard, the Village will be called Home in Hilliard, whose mission will be to help older adults who want to stay in their homes and live independently. Home in Hilliard will achieve this with the work of a group of volunteers that will provide transportation, assist with chores around the home that get more difficult as individuals age, and provide referrals to existing services in the community.

Who Will Benefit?

Home in Hilliard members will receive services and help through a group of volunteers. Members may also choose to be volunteers, but volunteers will be recruited throughout the community, strengthening the fabric of Hilliard.

What is a Village?

Villages are not bricks and mortar communities, congregate living, a cluster of cottages, or a commune. Home in Hilliard will be a non-profit, volunteer and membership-driven organization of people in our community where neighbors help neighbors.

Villages are funded through membership fees, grants, donations and on-going fundraising. There will be a fee for membership that will cover the costs for a small staff and general operational expenses.

Services will be provided by vetted volunteers, providing opportunities for all Hilliard residents to become involved in making our community a greater place for all its citizens.

When Will Home in Hilliard Start?

The group’s goal is to start serving its members during the first quarter of 2025. Recruiting volunteer staff members will begin around November 2024. Understanding how a Village works is key to its success, and organizers welcome those voices who want to help spread the news about this exciting initiative.

Where is a Village?

This is the easy part! The where is “where you are, or where you want to be or to go.” It’s inside your home or outside in your yard. It is rides to appointments, events, groceries, and parks. The list is long and flexible.

Why Support Home in Hilliard as Our Community’s Village Model?

The Village model has emerged as an innovative way to support an aging society. It is a consumer-driven model that aims to promote aging in place for community-dwelling older adults.

Older adults who join Villages, particularly those who actively participate, experience improvements in the areas of social engagement, civic engagement, quality of life, and confidence in believing we can age in our own homes.

As Home in Hilliard is developed, more information will be coming, especially related to how to be a member, how to be a volunteer and other ways that you can support this great initiative. ■

How to Handle Yard Waste

The City of Hilliard has you covered when it comes to grass clippings, leaves, branches, Christmas trees, and other yard waste. Not only does the City provide various services for managing yard waste, we ensure it's done in the most eco-friendly way possible.

Yard Waste

There are two ways yard waste is collected in Hilliard: Through the automatic weekly Tuesday collections (great for most yard waste) and through on-demand chipper service for larger limbs and brush.

Weekly Collection

Grass clippings, leaves, and branches/brush under four feet long can be bagged for Tuesday collection by Local Waste from April 1 through Nov. 31.

These smaller items should be placed in biodegradable bags or into a bin marked "yard waste" and set at the curb on Tuesdays to be collected with trash and recycling. (Yard waste stickers for containers are available at the Hilliard Municipal Building.)

Longer branches must be cut into lengths of four feet or shorter for Tuesday collection.

Do not place yard waste in plastic bags. Use only biodegradable paper bags (available from hardware and grocery stores) or clearly marked rigid containers.

Chipper Service

For branches and brush longer than 4 feet or thicker than 4 inches, the City offers an on-demand chipper service. Just complete a service request by visiting hilliardohio.gov/service-request or calling (614) 876-7361. The City chipper crew will come to your house on the second and fourth Fridays of the month from mid-April through mid-October.

If the City receives a large number of requests due to storms, collection also may occur on the following Monday. Scheduling chipper service allows the City to offer residents this amenity more cost-effectively than having crews drive throughout the entire community each week to seek out branches piled at the curb.

Before placing a service request, residents should place their large limbs and brush (more than 4-feet long and 4-inches in diameter) in the tree lawn near the curb. Do not include vines, thorns, root balls, grass of any kind, and foreign materials such as metal, lumber, nails, wire, string, rope, or staples in chipper piles.

This service is great for storm damage and resident landscaping needs. Those with excessive amounts or who are unable to wait for their scheduled pick up should make other arrangements. (We recommend dropping off at Ohio Mulch or Kurtz Brothers Mulch and Soil). Commercial companies hired to cut down trees or clear areas are solely responsible for removal.

Christmas Tree Recycling

Live trees are picked up to be recycled by Local Waste Services on the first three trash collection days after Christmas. Residents should leave their tree at the curb, free of ornaments and lights.





“Green” Facts

- Once collected, Local Waste recycles yard waste into compost and mulch.
- Branches collected by the City’s chipper service are mulched and used for park trail maintenance.
- Trees and logs removed by the City are sent to Com-Til, a composting program operated by the City of Columbus.
- Switching to an on-demand chipper service has saved the City on fuel costs and staff time, allowing crews to be more efficient

This summer has been a busy time with a lot of progress at Hilliard's new recreation and wellness campus. Not only have crews been working hard to stay on track with the construction schedule, but City of Hilliard Recreation and Parks staff have started preparing for the programming, facility, and hiring needs for The Well. Recently, you may have noticed a new roof and a lot of digging at The Well. Continue reading to learn more about what's going on at the construction site.

Concrete Poured

Concrete has been poured in the east portion of the facility, which includes the Hilliard Social Center (also known as the Senior Center), commercial kitchen, teaching kitchen, and hallway. Crews will continue to pour concrete throughout the summer.

Roof Installation

A new roof can be seen as you drive by The Well site on Scioto Darby and Alton Darby roads. The sloped sections of the roof will be metal, and the flat sections will be standard rubber.

Sky Lights and Slide Opening

The Well will feature a large water slide in its leisure pool. Crews have already created an opening in the roof for the slide, which will be seen from the outside of the facility. Framing for The Well's sky lights has also been added to the roof.

Color!

A new brand, complete with its own color pallet and logo, has been established for The Well. These colors will be featured throughout the building and on its signage and include shades of navy, sky blue, frost blue, seafoam green, salmon, yellow, and stone gray.

Gymnasium and Pool Framing

Underground digging has begun for the basketball courts and pools. The recreation and wellness campus will include a high-school-sized gymnasium, 25-yard lap pool, and 68,000-gallon leisure pool.

Parking Lots

There will be plenty of parking at The Well – nearly 400 spots. Crews have begun laying out the space for the four asphalt lots

Hilliard-based Advanced Drainage Solutions (ADS) has installed rows of StormTech green infrastructure chambers underneath the parking lot of the athletic complex and under the rest of the campus including The Well. This alternative system to conventional stormwater solutions mimics natural hydrology (water movement and distribution) by trapping pollutants the moment rain enters the drain until it's safely returned to its natural environment.

Construction is still estimated to be completed in the summer of 2025. The Well will include an aquatic facility, indoor running track, gymnasium, fitness center with weight room, space for fitness classes and community events, and a medical, health and wellness center operated by The Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center. The development of the surrounding park campus will include 22 athletic fields. ■

The Recreation and Parks Department staff is working on elevating programming for The Well. The community can look forward to indoor swimming lessons, aqua fitness classes, expanded preschool and youth programs, group fitness, and adult recreation and wellness classes. We look forward to providing opportunities for community input over the upcoming year.

Partnership with OSU Wexner Medical Center Creating **Culture of Health**

The future of health and wellness in Hilliard is bright thanks to an exciting partnership between the City of Hilliard and The Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center.

The Well, Hilliard's new 110,000-square-foot recreation and wellness center, is set to open in mid-2025, with 25,000-square-feet of space within this facility leased to Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center. The Well will offer comprehensive medical, health, and wellness services and programming as part of an inclusive gathering place for the Hilliard community.

"The goal is keeping people healthy where they are," said Jodi Kuri, Ambulatory Director of Wellness and Community Outreach at OSUWMC. "We want residents to be proactive about their health, and we are happy to have programs and experts to help them on that journey."

Hilliard residents will be able to tap into the vast resources offered by OSUWMC, as this collaboration brings together a wide range of wellness, education, and clinical services, along with community programming and classes. This portion of the facility will also offer same-day immediate care, sports medicine, orthopedic care, behavioral health, and outpatient rehabilitation, among other services.

Kuri oversees the "Exercise is Medicine" Program for various Central Ohio wellness facilities. She says program development is a collaborative process for each community, based on residents' feedback via questionnaires and surveys. Several Hilliard-based OSUWMC programs that are already being offered at other locations will transition to The Well in 2025. Additional surveys and community input will be gathered in the coming months via City of Hilliard platforms.

"Our mission is to be community based and accessible to our patients in every way possible," said Dan Like, Chief Administrative Officer of Ambulatory Services at OSUWMC. "Healthcare is not a one-size-fits-all approach, so our goal is to provide a spectrum of services, classes, and programs that meet the needs of all Hilliard residents, no matter their age or background."

Like says OSUWMC is working with the City and Hilliard's major employers to promote insurance accessibility. Some classes will be free, while others will require a modest fee or membership to The Well. There are also plans for educational classes and programs with the Hilliard City School District, where students can shadow healthcare professionals in both a clinical and non-clinical setting.

"A lot of people think healthcare and they think doctors and nurses, but there's so much more to offer when it comes to a student's future," said Elizabeth Lanker, Associate Director of Workforce Partnerships at OSUWMC. "There's a lot of power in seeing what's happening in real time to helping students understand what they want to do before attending a four-year college."

Other programs to be offered include experiential classes and training, mind-body movement classes, and meditation and mindfulness classes.

"Our partnership with The Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center is really a win-win because it reinforces the City's holistic approach to health and wellness for our residents. That also aligns with Ohio State Wexner Medical Center's mission and vision," said Hilliard City Manager Michelle Crandall.

The OSUWMC portion of the Well will also offer physical therapy for geriatric and aquatic rehabilitation, acupuncture, chiropractic care, therapeutic massage, and lifestyle medicine.

"I get really excited for us to be out in communities, because this is where health happens every day," Kuri said. "From the moment you walk into The Well, we want to create this culture of health by providing resources for people to embrace active, healthy lifestyles."

EQUIPPED TO SERVE

WHAT'S IN A HILLIARD POLICE CAR?

A Hilliard police officer's cruiser is essentially an office on wheels. Patrol officers spend almost all their time in or near their vehicles performing a variety of tasks such as patrolling roadways, writing incident reports, monitoring speed, directing traffic, processing crime scenes, and issuing citations. At the start of a shift, an officer rarely knows what will happen, so the equipment inside the vehicle ensures they are prepared to respond to any kind of emergency.



A **speed radar unit** is mounted to the cruiser's dash to monitor motorists' speed.

The **computer** is among the most important tools! It helps officers write reports and search law enforcement databases, among other activities.

Officers speak into the **microphone** to communicate using a brevity code (also known as a 10 code) to describe different aspects of a situation.

Communication is key, and the **radio head** lets officers speak with one another, dispatchers, and neighboring law enforcement agencies constantly.

The buttons on the **lights and sirens control** panel allow an officer to activate emergency LED lights and sirens. There are multiple light bar patterns synched with the vehicle's activity. For example, parked lights are in a slower flash pattern to reduce distraction, but when the vehicle is in motion the flash pattern is faster to attract more attention.

THE TECH IN THE TRUNK

A The **investigation bag** stores items used to process crime scenes.

B **First-aid kits** include tourniquets, emergency blankets, tape, gauze, scissors, bandages, and an emergency blanket.

C **Digital cameras** are used to photograph crime scenes

D An **AED** is used to help people experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. The machine analyzes the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, delivers an electrical shock to help the heart re-establish an effective rhythm.

E **Fuseses (road flares)** are used at traffic crashes to notify motorists to use caution.



F **Floataion vests** and throw rope (50 feet) are used when responding to water emergencies.

G A **broom** and **snow scraper** are used to clean off debris from roadways after car crashes.

H **Power distribution** units run power to all electronics in the vehicle.

I **The core** runs the equipment needed to activate lights and sirens.

J **File storage** stores the files captured from the vehicle's dash cameras.

The City of Hilliard collects Styrofoam for recycling at a drop-off building in the Operations Department parking lot, just left of the Municipal Building parking lot (3770 Municipal Way). The shed is open 24/7 and there is no charge to drop off Styrofoam. The Styrofoam must be clean and free of stickers and tape. Food containers and Styrofoam peanuts are not accepted.



Bradley Gives Back to Hometown Through Public Service

Hard work and dedication to her hometown have paid off for Anastasia Bradley, a longtime City of Hilliard employee who has worked her way up in the Recreation and Parks Department since 2010.

“I’ve always felt like the City and I have grown together over the years,” Bradley said.

Her fun and spunky personality, coupled with her passionate work ethic, has made Bradley a favorite among co-workers and residents. She started working for the City as a lifeguard at the age of 16 and enjoyed the camaraderie so much that she never left. After serving as a lifeguard for four years, Bradley transitioned to Pool Manager for three years and then to Aquatics Supervisor for seven years.

Earlier in 2024, she was promoted to Facility Manager for The Well, where she will be instrumental in planning and operating the City’s new state-of-the-art recreation and wellness center, which is currently under construction and set to open in mid-2025. She will also supervise the aquatics and fitness divisions and building operations, which includes guest services, custodial, and maintenance staff.

“The Well will create so many exciting new opportunities for our community,” Bradley said. “I’m thrilled to be part of something from the ground floor and build this first-class facility into a special place for our residents.”

In many ways, Bradley’s new job is a dream come true, because she has the chance to give back to the

community she grew up in. Upon graduating from Hilliard Darby High School in 2012, she went on to earn a bachelor’s degree from the Scripps College of Communication at Ohio University. More recently, Bradley continued her education by earning a master’s degree in public administration from Franklin University in 2023. She’s also a Certified Parks and Recreation Professional and earned her Six Sigma Black Belt Certification last year.

“As a supervisor, I love being the first one there to help out when needed,” Bradley said. “But through my training and experience, I’ve also learned to empower those around me to be problem solvers themselves.”

The Well facility will greatly expand the services offered by the City of Hilliard Recreation and Parks Department, with expanded hours of operation and a whole new lineup of classes and programs for residents. Bradley admits it’s a big undertaking, but it’s one she’s prepared for her entire career.

“My favorite thing about my job and life in general is that every single day is different,” Bradley said. “There are so many moving parts to facilities and aquatics, and to me it’s like a giant puzzle where I’m trying to piece everything together as efficiently as possible. I love the challenge.”

In her free time, Bradley enjoys crafting, live music, football, traveling, and is a self-proclaimed true crime fanatic. She’s also a stepmother to three. She and her fiancé, Adam Maynard, are set to wed this November.

Hilliard Chamber Provides Connection, Voice, Support to Business Community



At 51 years and counting of serving the business community, the Hilliard Area Chamber of Commerce is ready for the future.

The Chamber provides business advocacy and connection, events, and networking opportunities. The organization's first meeting was in 1972 with 12 members. Today, it has grown to serve nearly 500 businesses – many of which are small businesses.

"We're evolving and working toward how we can stay relevant and valuable to our members," said President and CEO Courtney Smyser, who took over the organization's helm from her mother, Libby Gierach, earlier this year. Smyser brings more than 20 years of association management experience and has quite literally grown up around business advocacy and relationship building.

A recent strategic plan identified goals for the future, which includes developing new programs allowing similar businesses to connect on a smaller scale, creating a business advocacy committee, completing a technology audit, and working with the local Ohio Small Business Development Center to provide additional business counseling.

"We want to connect, be a voice of the business community, and provide support," said Smyser, who noted that many of the members are small businesses who need someone to keep an eye on state and national issues. It's a mission important to Chamber Board Chair Jill Gerschutz, who was first a Chamber member representing Credit Union of Ohio. She has served on the board since 2012, and previously served as an ambassador – a role that helped her quickly get to know others in the community.

"There are a lot of businesses that have one to five employees, so it's difficult for them to take the time to see potential impact of things happening at the statehouse," Gerschutz said. "We can be their voice and help keep them informed."

The Chamber has a reputation for its well-attended events, including Connections and Coffee, which allows for informal conversation; fun on the course at the annual Golf Outing; and a community holiday gathering at the Hollyfest Arts & Crafts Show.

A long-running favorite event, the Taste of Hilliard and Business Expo is being reimagined this fall as Taste of the Town. Restaurants and catering partners will showcase food and beverages to attendees.

The event is an exclusive adults-only affair that's going to be more of an "intimate experience," Gerschutz said. Looking at the second half of the century, Smyser is excited for the Chamber to continue to grow alongside the City.

"You can see how the business landscape is changing with growth, and the next generation is coming into leadership – it's an exciting time," Smyser said. "There are a lot of young families who live here, and these young families are the business owners. I'm excited to see how we're going to shape this community moving forward." ■



COTA LinkUS Initiative Will Benefit Hilliard, Central Ohio

As residents of one of the fastest-growing regions in the nation, Hilliard and other Central Ohio voters will have a chance to support a significant transportation and economic development initiative at the ballot box this fall.

Known as LinkUS, the Central Ohio Transit Authority (COTA) initiative will create a dedicated funding stream for modernized and increased transit, sidewalks and bikeways.

The City of Hilliard is working with COTA, Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission, Franklin County, and the City of Columbus to ensure our community is part of shaping the LinkUS vision and implementation plan.

“It is crucial that the City of Hilliard be part of the dialogue, and that we’re working hand in hand with other entities throughout Central Ohio to prepare our communities for the challenges and opportunities that our growing increases in population will create,” said City Manager Michelle Crandall. “The City just completed updating its long-range Comprehensive Plan, and the COTA LinkUS initiative aligns with our community’s own vision for a safe, walkable, environmentally secure future.”

The LinkUS vision

In November, COTA will ask voters in Franklin County and parts of Delaware, Fairfield, Union and Licking counties to approve replacing COTA’s current half-penny sales tax with a new one-penny sales tax.



How will this benefit Hilliard?

Hilliard could see numerous direct and indirect benefits, including:

- An extension of the Heritage Trail from Hilliard to the Arena District in Columbus
- A shared-use path on Dublin Road from Dublin to Quarry Trails Metro Park
- A sidewalk and shared-use path on Leap Road between Cemetery Road and Scioto Darby Road
- A shared-use path on Davidson Road from Lyman Drive to Trueman Boulevard, including modifications to the existing bridge over I-270
- A shared-use path on Hayden Run Road from Avery Road to Eventing Way
- Converting sidewalks to a shared-use path on Cemetery Road from Leap Road to Britton Parkway (Phase 1), from the future Heritage Trail/Norwich Street to Leap Road (Phase 2), and from the Innovative Learning Center to the future Heritage Trail/Norwich Street (Phase 3)
- COTA//Plus on-demand shuttle service, using 10- to 12-seat wheelchair-accessible vans
- New bus service connecting Hilliard with The Ohio State University and Dublin

Investments in Central Ohio from these new funds would include:

- 45% more COTA service
- 500-plus miles of new and improved sidewalks, bike lanes and bike trails
- Eight new COTA//Plus zones (an app-based, on-demand transit shuttle service)
- Five new rapid transit corridors, with fast, frequent service in dedicated lanes

How will this benefit the region?

A modernized transportation system is essential to attracting and retaining young talent while providing older adults with the freedom to age in place and help people with disabilities get where they need to go.

This connectivity will yield significant benefits in the region, including improving the ability for everyone to get to work and medical appointments, walk or bike to local parks and restaurants, avoid traffic, and travel throughout Central Ohio with a lower environmental footprint.

Hilliard Named Top 7 Intelligent Community for Second Year


The City of Hilliard has been named one of the world's top seven intelligent communities in the world for the second year in a row.

Hilliard was one of seven communities – and one of only two in the United States – to receive this honor for 2024 from the Intelligent Community Forum (ICF). The program recognizes communities that demonstrate best practices in broadband connectivity, workforce development, digital inclusion, innovation, community engagement, and sustainability.

ICF co-founder John Jung said, "The Intelligent Community journey is not completed in a day or a year but builds from strategies and small triumphs to much greater accomplishment by people and organizations across the community. Intelligent Communities balance continuity and innovation, digital connectivity and the person-to-person kind, the economy of today and the emerging economy of tomorrow."

Hilliard received this same recognition in 2023. Other cities earning this designation for 2024 were Assaí, Brazil; Coral Gables, Florida; Curitiba, Brazil; Durham Region in Ontario, Canada; Fredericton in New Brunswick, Canada; and Yunlin County, Taiwan. One of these seven finalists will be named the Intelligent Community of the Year at the ICF Summit in November in Barcelona, Spain.

According to ICF, Hilliard rose to the top of candidates because "in just a few years, its municipal dark-fiber network has attracted many service providers, while connecting companies, schools and city buildings, saving hundreds of thousands of dollars. Its partnership with Amazon Web Services brings technology and business education into schools, while the City and its partners have launched more than a dozen apprenticeship programs in technology, healthcare and IT." ICF also highlighted the exciting progress being made locally through the Hilliard City Lab initiative. ■



Online System Puts Crime Stats At Your Fingertips

The City of Hilliard Division of Police has launched a new crime mapping tool, Citizen Connect.

The online tool is connected to the department's records management system and allows users to track crime in the Hilliard police jurisdiction. Users can search cases, incidents and traffic crashes by date, location, and type of crime.

Search results will include incident type, report number, date the incident was reported, and a block number. The exact addresses will not be included.

Citizens can also create an account to receive alerts for when a crime occurs in a certain area. ■




Pumpkin Composting

Hilliard Sites Offer Advantages For Passenger Rail

Two adjacent locations along the existing CSX line in Hilliard offer significant advantages as possible sites for a future Amtrak passenger rail station that could accommodate up to 100,000 arrivals and departures per year.

That figure was among findings of a feasibility study completed this spring by infrastructure consulting firm AECOM. The study identified benefits to the Hilliard sites that include proximity to I-270, land that is already owned by the City of Hilliard, and existing restaurant, hotel, and retail amenities that would serve passengers.

The study indicates the sites – just north of Cemetery Road and immediately west of I-270 – are ideally suited for a suburban station that would support the Federal Railroad Administration’s considerations to reintroduce passenger rail service through Central Ohio.

Distinct advantages

According to AECOM’s research, advantages of developing a station on the Hilliard sites include:

Site Design: Both sites can be designed to accommodate 20,000 to 100,000 arrivals and departures per year, with room for future growth.

City-owned Land: The City already owns the land on the western site and a portion of the land on the eastern site.

Convenient Access: In addition to being very near north and southbound I-270, stations at these locations would be within a 15-minute drive for nearly a half-million people – and within a 30-minute drive for nearly 1.43 million people.

Multi-Modal Hub: The site would be built to serve as a multi-modal transportation hub, with access to current and future COTA bus lines, the Central Ohio multi-use trail network, and on-demand shuttle & micro-transit service.

Amenities: Stations built on either site would be within walking distance of existing convenient amenities, including hotels, restaurants, grocery and other retail stores, and major Central Ohio businesses.

Development Opportunities: The City of Hilliard’s Comprehensive Community Plan identifies the Cemetery Road corridor as an important focus area for future redevelopment as a regionally significant mixed-use economic development hub. The rail station also would be close to other areas that are already seeing significant development and redevelopment, including the I-270 corridor.

Creating Opportunities: Placing a station in Hilliard aligns with the US Department of Transportation’s Justice40 initiative, which is focused on disadvantaged communities and is designed to increase affordable transportation options, fight climate change, and improve access to resources and quality of life. ■

Code of Conduct

Upon entering a City of Hilliard recreation facility and/or participating in a Recreation and Parks Department program, you are agreeing to abide by the rules of the department and any specific rules for programs or facilities. Your cooperation and consideration of this Code of Conduct helps ensure all participants can enjoy our programs, facilities, and parks. The Recreation and Parks Department is committed to providing a safe and welcoming environment for all our patrons and staff.

Fair Share

The Recreation and Parks Department is largely financed through taxes paid by individuals living or working within Hilliard city boundaries. For that reason, we verify residency annually. Those who are unable to verify that they live or work within Hilliard city boundaries must pay a higher fee. We also delay activating pool memberships until verification of residency or employment is provided. We accept proof of residency or employment in person at our Community Center during normal business hours; via mail at Hilliard Community Center, 3800 Veterans Memorial Drive, Hilliard, Ohio 43026; by email at recandparks@hilliardohio.gov; or uploaded to a RecTrac account.

City Residents (R) receive the lowest rates. Having a Hilliard mailing address or attending Hilliard City Schools does not necessarily mean you live within city boundaries. We verify residency each year on the Franklin County Auditor’s website. Renters must provide (in person or via email) a utility bill, government-issued ID, or other proof of residency.

Non-Residents Paying Hilliard Income Taxes also receive the resident rate. To prove employment, you must provide a valid government-issued ID and one of the following each year:

- A pay stub from the previous 30 days that includes the employee’s full name and current address.
- Proof of employment on company letterhead with the signature of the patron’s supervisor or company president

School District/Non-Residents are those who neither live nor work within Hilliard city boundaries. These individuals pay a higher fee.

Refunds

All refund requests must be submitted in writing to recandparks@hilliardohio.gov in accordance with the policies below.

Low Enrollment If a program/class does not meet the minimum requirement of participants, the class will be canceled and a full refund will be issued to those enrolled.

General Recreation Program Any cancellation or request for a refund prior to 10 days of the start of the program/class will result in a full refund. If a cancellation or refund request is needed within the 10-day window of that program/class starting, a 10% processing fee will be charged. If the cancellation drops the program/class below the minimum student enrollment, a refund will not be issued.

55 Plus A full refund is issued if registration is canceled before the posted deadline. Refunds less than \$10 are automatically credited to your household account. Trip registrations canceled after the posted deadline are not eligible for refunds unless there is a waiting list and someone is able to take your place.

Swim Lessons Refund requests and/or transfers must be submitted at least seven days before the first class. Refunds may reflect a \$5 processing fee and are granted only for medical restriction, approved hardship, or relocation outside of a 25-mile radius of the Community Center. Documentation is required.

Pool Membership Refunds are not issued for pool memberships.

Summer Rec Camps Cancellation requests submitted by March 15 will result in a \$75 processing fee. Refunds will not be issued after March 15.

Inclement Weather In the event of inclement weather, Hilliard Recreation and Parks Department may close facilities or cancel/delay any program, special event, or drop-in activity.

This decision is made for the safety of our patrons based upon the severity of roads and weather.

To get up-to-date cancellation information, follow our Facebook pages, visit hilliardohio.gov, or call (614) 334-2598. This line is updated daily with changes, closures, and cancellations of special events, aquatics, sports, and programs.

Programs scheduled before 5 p.m. are canceled when Hilliard City School District closes or is on a delay due to inclement weather.

Canceled programs scheduled after 5 p.m. are determined by 4 p.m. the day of the activity on weekdays.

Weekend cancellation is determined and communicated before 9 a.m. Programs are canceled at 7:30 a.m. if a Level 2 snow emergency exists.

Annual Shutdown The Hilliard Community Center and Hilliard Social Center are closed Saturday, Aug. 31, through Sunday, Sept. 8, for annual deep cleaning and maintenance. Program registration is available online. All City parks will remain open during this time.






