




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Continues to Evolve

It's a Thursday evening in Downtown Hilliard, and as the summer sun dips, the crowd gathered at Hilliard's Station Park heats up for another set from the live band.

Earlier in the day, children skipped through the fountains as their parents unpacked lunch and specialty treats picked up from one of Downtown's unique restaurants. Across the street, a group of bicyclists break from the bike trail to duck into a quaint shop and can't resist taking home a new treasure.

Downtown Hilliard has always been the heart of our community, but it hasn't always looked this way. The area has been revitalized over the past decade, transforming from a seemingly forgotten corner into a vibrant community gathering place.

"We've lived here 26 years and there was nothing in Downtown – you just drove through it," said Angela Zody, the City of Hilliard's Downtown Manager. "Now, everything has come together with the park, the businesses, and the trail. As more people come to visit, they fall in love."

During the 1800s, "Hilliard's Station" – as the community was called – was along the railroad route of the Piqua and Indiana Railroad. The tracks came through what are now Main and Center streets and remained in use until 1962, when railroad services ceased.

In the 2000s, City staff was inspired to invest in the neighborhood and create Hilliard's Station Park. The park marks the location of the old railroad station and serves as the trailhead of the 7-mile Heritage Rail Trail — making it an ideal destination for pedestrians and bicyclists.

"The idea was to have a venue for a variety of things people could come take advantage of," said City Planner John Talentino, one of the spearheaders of the project. The park was designed to host events with interactive splash fountains, built-in seating, outdoor café tables, and public restrooms.

The space opened to the public in 2015, and the Celebration at the Station concert series was born shortly thereafter. The greater area is now the growing home to 130 businesses, retail restaurants, service industries, and more, attracting people from all walks of life.

One of the anchor developments is Center Street Market, which became the neighborhood's centerpiece when it opened across from the park in 2020. The 17,000-square-foot market includes Crooked Can Brewery and taproom, several tasty food vendors, and a 7,000-square-foot patio.

"Once this space became available it was an instant yes – we want to be there," said Rob Fry, co-owner of Crooked Can. "It's exactly as we envisioned it, and that's pretty cool."

Soon after, more business owners wanted to invest in the area. Westwood Collective transformed a Franklin Street warehouse into The Junction, a co-working space, and Sexton's Pizza. On Main Street, Hilliard Station Baking Co. serves gourmet cupcakes from a historic building, and HillGarten offers German-inspired beers and bites from its outdoor biergarten.

In 2024, a winery will join the area. Firefly Winery will offer a variety of wines and small plates in an elegant setting at the corner of Grant and Franklin streets. In addition to the winery, Westwood Collective will develop an outdoor area

on the property known as The Yard, described as a park-like setting with a pond, plenty of seating, and yard games.

The latest additions join the community's existing landmarks. Just down the road, the Franklin County Fairgrounds welcomes thousands of visitors year-round with exciting events. Weaver Park is home to Hilliard's Historical Village and pays homage to Hilliard's past. Throughout, guests can enjoy dinner, shopping, and adult beverages within the area's Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area (DORA), which runs daily from noon to 9 p.m.

City leaders recognize the area as a community gem and prioritized its strategic development within the recent update to the Comprehensive Plan. Downtown Hilliard is a walkable and vibrant area with a distinct sense of place that allows people to live, work, and play in one "neighborhood." That will continue to be the goal as new development occurs.

"Downtown Hilliard is a perfect example of thoughtful, planned growth, and it has put itself on the map," Zody said. "We're excited for what the next decade will bring."





Expanding Recreational Programs Ahead!

With the new Hilliard Recreation and Wellness Campus and The Well on the horizon, the City of Hilliard is buzzing with excitement about new opportunities, especially when it comes to recreation!

The Recreation and Parks Department already provides a wide variety of classes, camps, and programs for the Hilliard community. You might be familiar with some of the most popular offerings, such as Safety Town, various sports leagues, Summer Rec Camp, and senior luncheons.

With the 2025 arrival of The Well, Hilliard's recreation and wellness center, the department's staff is already working to expand its programs and classes.

This expansion will give Hilliard the space necessary to provide more programming options, and the Recreation and Parks Department is working hard to produce new partnerships and opportunities that will lead to quality new programs for the community.

"Our programming team has been tasked with producing two or three new programs and one out-of-the-box idea each season as we approach the opening of The Well," said Deputy Director of Recreation and Parks Erin Duffee. "Some of our newest and grandest opportunities will come from the partnership with The Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center, as well as the opportunity to provide memberships to The Well that will allow the use of the fitness floor, group exercise classes, and indoor aquatic spaces."

Curious to know what some of these new recreational classes and opportunities will look like? Here are a few in the works:

Young Innovators Entrepreneurship Camp

Embark on an exciting journey of innovation, creativity, and business acumen at Entrepreneurship Camp, designed exclusively for teenagers this summer! The immersive and dynamic camp is tailor-made for young minds eager to explore the world of entrepreneurship, develop essential skills, and turn their innovative ideas into reality.

Entrepreneurship Camp will partner with local businesses to give teenagers the chance to brainstorm, refine, and develop their entrepreneurial ideas with the guidance of experienced mentors. From ideation to validation, this camp provides a supportive environment for turning concepts into viable business proposals.

CoolTech Girls

The City of Hilliard followed the growing trend of women in STEM and added the CoolTech Girls programs in 2023, and it was a huge success! This collaborative program for school-age girls ignites their passion in science and technology through workshops and role models.

Participants learned from female volunteers and mentors with engineering and technical backgrounds in the Hilliard community. In fall of 2023, 25 girls learned about "technofashion" from seven volunteers by sewing light-up headbands and jewelry with programmable LEDs.

Recreation and Parks plans to bring back the CoolTech Girls program in 2024 and 2025 in a larger capacity to reach more girls interested in exploring a future in STEM.

Fashion Design Camp

Be on the lookout for a new program this summer that focuses on fashion! The Recreation and Parks Department has lined up fashion industry expert Krista Allison (who got her start in New York City) to teach fashion tips to Hilliard kids ages 8 to 13. Participants will leave camp with designs to wear and treasure for years to come. At the end of camp, students will create a "lookbook" to share with friends and family.







More to Come

These are just a few of the new and diverse programs residents will see in 2024. Other exciting offerings to look forward to include adult educational workshops, technology, healthy cooking classes, wellness and mindfulness programming, cultural programming, and other activities that will help to build connections within the community!

"We want to hear from residents on the types of programs they want to see and experience at The Well. Look for future opportunities to provide feedback on program options by means of surveys, focus groups, and community meetings," Duffee said.



Cosgray Road Extension

The first layer of asphalt has been smoothly applied to the Cosgray Road extension and its three roundabouts, paving the way for connectivity to The Well. The extension is expected to be complete in October 2024.



Green Stormwater Solutions

Hilliard-based Advanced Drainage Solutions (ADS) installed rows of StormTech green infrastructure chambers underneath The Well and the park's athletic complex. This alternative system to conventional stormwater solutions mimics natural hydrology (water movement and distribution) by trapping pollutants the moment rain enters the drain until it's safely returned to its natural environment. ADS donated \$500,000 of stormwater management products to the campus.

Final Steel Beam

Structural work on The Well has been completed. This milestone was celebrated by City Officials, staff and construction crews in February during a "Topping Off" ceremony where the final steel beam was lifted into place.



Turf on Two Athletic Fields

The new recreation and wellness campus includes 20 natural grass fields plus two large synthetic turf fields. The turf on the synthetic fields was installed over the winter. The grass on the natural turf fields will be fully planted this spring.



The City of Hilliard is prioritizing protection of water quality and important wildlife habitats along an important tributary to the Big Darby as it moves forward with construction at its new recreation and wellness campus.

Going green is one of the major themes of the future recreation and wellness campus, which is one of the largest capital projects in the City's history. This priority is especially evident in the City's efforts to preserve Clover Groff Run. This protected stream is part of the Big Darby Creek watershed and runs between Roger A. Reynolds Municipal Park and the City's new recreation and wellness campus.

"Clover Groff Run was originally a farm ditch created to assist in draining water from abutting farm fields," said City Engineer Clark Rausch. "The problem was the original ditch wasn't providing adequate habitat to the stream's native species. So, every time a large storm event happened, the natural habitat would get washed away."

Rausch says the preservation of this area, southeast of Scioto Darby and Alton Darby roads, has been more than 15 years in the making. In 2008, voters around the state approved the Clean Ohio Conservation Funds (COCF) program to acquire green space and restore stream corridors. After years of planning and approval, the City leveraged these resources in 2016 to restore nearly 1,200 feet of Clover Groff Run just south of Scioto Darby Road.

Improvements included widening the stream's floodplain area, adding more natural plants, and meandering the channel to slow the erosion process. The remaining portion of the project was put on hold until necessary easements could be acquired. In 2022, the City received an additional \$600,000 from the Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission as part of the COCF program. This allowed the City to restore the remaining 2,800-foot portion

of the stream at the southern portion of the property. Most of this work was completed in 2023, with plans to add a pedestrian bridge over the stream in 2024.

"This project greatly improves the water quality that feeds into the Big Darby Creek, plus provides native species and wildlife in the area with much needed habitat," Rausch said. "There's also an added benefit of improving the water quality of the drainage and stormwater runoff from the new wellness campus site."

Clover Groff Run will accept the stormwater from the campus, which also is equipped with state-of-the-art stormwater management systems for The Well and the future athletic fields. In October, Hilliard-based company Advanced Drainage Systems donated \$500,000 worth of its products, which included their signature yellow StormTech underground detention system. These underground systems collect, filter, and store stormwater runoff, replacing or supplementing above-ground retention ponds. This kind of storage and filtering benefits the environment, protecting the water quality of Clover Groff and the Big Darby.

"The City has maintained a focus on environmental sustainability during this entire process," said Ed Merritt, Director of Hilliard Recreation and Parks. "We're also using organic infill on the synthetic turf fields and specialized plant material throughout the campus to leave this community resource better than we found it."

The Well remains on track for a mid-2025 grand opening. The goal is to use the campus to enhance active recreation offerings and educate Hilliard residents and visitors alike on the sustainability efforts used to make the region a better place for the future.

Doggy Do's & Don'ts at the Dog Park!

Socialization is important to having a well-rounded dog that is friendly to others, and a local park, such as the amazing Heritage Rail Trail dog park, is the perfect place to make puppy pals. Following a few doggy do's and don'ts will make your time at the dog park more rewarding.





Follow the dog park rules. Your dog can't read, so it's up to owners to familiarize themselves with posted park rules.



Consider leaving young children at home. An overly enthusiastic child can heighten a dog's anxiety, causing it to react in a way that's inconsistent with its usual behavior.



Don't bring new-born puppies and aggressive dogs to the park. Puppies are at a higher risk of contracting diseases and being injured by larger dogs. Aggressive dogs should also avoid the park. If your dog lunges, barks excessively, growls, or fights, it may be a danger to other people and pets.



Take it slowly. Keep your first few visits to the park to just 10 to 15 minutes until you and your pet become comfortable with the atmosphere. Avoid peak use hours, such as weekday evenings and weekends.



Use the proper area at the dog park. Most dog parks have separate areas for large and small dogs. Small dogs – even those with "big dog energy" – can be overwhelmed by the larger dogs' aggressive sniffing or playing.



Supervise your dog. Always keep an eye on your dog. Watch for changes in body language so you can de-escalate trouble before it starts. And always clean up after your pooch!



Don't enter the main area of the dog park with a lead or harness on. Entering the main enclosure with your dog on a lead can cause them stress when other dogs approach.



Leave toys and treats at home. Offering your pet treats in front of others can create jealousy and aggression from other dogs. Instead, reward your dog with praise and pets when they play well and listen to instructions. A ball is an acceptable dog park toy, but leave chew toys like bones and stuffed animals at home.



Bring water. Not all parks have a water source. Bring bottled water and a collapsible water bowl, as your dog definitely will work up a thirst.



Learn to read body language in your dog. Learning your dog's body language helps you understand how it is handling its experience at the park. Knowing the difference between play, fear, and aggression can make your time at the park safer and more rewarding. Heavy panting and over excitement are also indicators that it's time to head home.



Be mindful of dogs that play too rough. Certain dogs, particularly those with arthritic joints, do not enjoy being rolled, pinned, or knocked over. If your dog plays rough, match them with other dogs that can tolerate rough play.



Don't physically intervene in a dog fight. Never reach in to break up fighting dogs. You could be seriously injured or killed! Using distraction techniques such as splashing them with water, throwing a towel over both dogs, or dropping something near them can usually break up the encounter. ■



Hilliard First Responders Offer Active Shooter Event Trainings, Advice

Active shooter events have happened across the world. They can happen quickly, often before you realize what is occurring. Would you know what to do if you were caught in one of these horrible tragedies?

The City of Hilliard Division of Police has partnered with the Norwich Township Fire Department to provide a course that provides strategies, guidance, and a proven plan for surviving an active shooter event.

The course is called C.R.A.S.E., which stands for Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events.

"It's an uncomfortable topic I wish we didn't have to teach," said Officer Tony Agosta, who has been a C.R.A.S.E. instructor for more than seven years. "But it's a proactive and realistic approach."

Topics include the history and prevalence of active shooter events, the role of professional guardians, civilian response options, medical care, and interactive drills.

The course was developed on the "Avoid, Deny, Defend" strategy as an easy-to-remember method for individuals to follow. Hiding and hoping a threatening person will not cause harm isn't a very effective survival strategy, Officer Agosta said.

"We're giving people permission to fight back – you have it in you to defend yourself, your family, and your coworkers," Officer

Agosta said. "People are a lot tougher than they think, and you can see people realizing they can do it."

Many businesses, churches, and organizations have hosted the free class. Recently, instructors taught at the Noor Islamic Cultural Center (NICC), a Hilliard mosque.

"We are a very busy center, and we thought we should be prepared for any unforeseeable situation," said NICC's Executive Director, Azhar Masood. "This was one of the most important trainings our staff and security team should do."

Students learned to watch for unusual activities, stay calm, and to know their surroundings well, Masood said.

"The relationship with Hilliard police is very helpful," he added.

The course is offered, by appointment, to larger organizations. Individuals can enroll in Saturday classes offered throughout the year at the Safety Services Building.

"If the call comes, we want to be the first ones in the door," said Officer Agosta. "But, until then, we want you to have the tools to defend yourself."

Aileen Burnside Recreation and Parks Maintenance Aide

Burnside is one of the City's most tenured part-time employees, having worked more than 27 years. She started as a swim instructor in 1996 and has worked in numerous other roles, including lifeguard training. Now, Burnside works as a maintenance aide in the Downtown Hilliard corridor, keeping Hilliard's Station Park and the surrounding areas clean and litter free.

"The people here are what make this job so great, and I love being out and about interacting with this community," Burnside said. "Many of us part-timers are kind of a 'jack-of-all trades,' having worked in a variety of roles over the years, but I wouldn't trade it for anything."



Sue Lantz Senior Center Trip and Kitchen Aide

Lantz is a favorite of many members of the Hilliard Senior Center. She started part-time with the City in 2012, working as a Trip Aide for the Senior Center day trips and helping in the kitchen for the twice-a-week senior lunches. Lantz still works two to three days a week, primarily as a Senior Trip Aide, where she travels with groups, keeping track of all the check-ins and often serving as a tour guide.

"With this job, I've traveled to so many different locations in Ohio that sometimes I feel like I work for a travel agency," Lantz joked. "All the staff and seniors here at the center are wonderful. During COVID, I wrote a lot of handwritten notes of encouragement and inspiration to cheer them up, so they've really become like family."



















Jeff Metzger Senior Center Bus Driver

Working for the City of Hilliard is Metzger's part-time retirement gig. He started as the Senior Center Bus Driver in April 2023 after retiring from COTA, where he worked for 13 years. Metzger works two to three days a week, depending on the Senior Center trip schedules. He makes sure all participants get to and from their destination in a safe and timely manner.

"Working in this part-time role is really the perfect gig for me," Metzger said. "It allows me to get out and interact with people, and everyone at the HSC has been great. Plus, in retirement, the extra money helps, and there's plenty of flexibility when it comes to family and personal matters."



Carleen Hildebrand Senior Center Front Desk

Hildebrand has served the City in a part-time capacity more than 20 years. Earlier in her career, she worked full-time as a technical writer before transitioning to a part-time role with the City to allow more time to raise her four children. During her time in Hilliard, she's held a variety of positions with the Recreation and Parks Department and currently performs front desk duties for the Hilliard Senior Center.

"I love this job because every day is different, and it gives me the opportunity to welcome new members of our community to our programming and facilities," Hildebrand said. "Working for the City of Hilliard has allowed me to put my family first, make lifelong friends, and enjoy a sense of community, not to mention have lots of fun!"

Ferris Wheels and Deep-Fried Meals

Fairgrounds Remain A Hilliard Tradition

From elephant ears and Ferris wheels to carnival games and livestock shows, there is nothing else quite like a county fair.

And in Central Ohio, each July brings all the excitement and tradition of the Franklin County Fair to Hilliard.

"The county fair is a part of Americana," said Kevin Wiley, president of the Franklin County Agricultural Society Board of Directors. "Fairs have been around for a long time, and there's a reason for that. This is part of the fabric of America."

While the first Franklin County Fair was held in October 1851, the event did not move to its official home in Hilliard until 1918. Even then, the fair was held on leased property until the Ag Society was able to buy that land in 1946. From that time forward, the fairgrounds have been in the heart of the Hilliard community.

"Years ago, when the fairgrounds first found its home here, Hilliard was very rural and it was a natural place for it to sit," said Amy Fleshman, fairgrounds manager. Now, there is significantly less farmland in Hilliard. The importance of agriculture is still the heart and primary focus of the fair, though.

"Agriculture is what sustains life," Fleshman said. "Even when people come to the fair and they may not be ag-minded, many of them come for the food." All that tasty fair food – from the corn dogs to the funnel cakes – is part of the ag industry. It's the 4-H youth exhibits, competitions, harness racing, and other elements that fall under the umbrella of agriculture that remain at the core of the fairgrounds' mission.

Nearly 45,000 people come to the fair each July, but Fleshman and Wiley explain that is just the tip of the iceberg when it comes to the benefits the fairgrounds brings to the community. A conservative estimate of 200,000 people attended more than 110 events on the grounds in 2023.

Bringing in a diverse slate of events – ranging from craft shows and lobster sales to the annual Food Truck Festival and monthly reptile shows – makes the fairgounds a source of economic benefit for the community.

Wiley said that approach also makes good business sense for the Ag Board.

"Fairs make money sometimes. Sometimes they don't. You can't rely on that," he said. "You have to have a more reliable source of income, and we have to invest back into maintaining and updating the grounds. We certainly would not be able to do it without the cooperation of the Franklin County Commissioners."

The fairgrounds also is an asset and partner to the community. It has served as a training ground for the City of Hilliard Division of Police, Franklin County Sheriff's Office, and Norwich Township. It is home to 4-H and other youth activities. And the Ag Society plans the community's annual July 4 parade on behalf of the City of Hilliard.

Sam Brill, director of Destination Hilliard, said the fairgrounds are a valuable part of the local tourism economy.

"The Franklin County Fairgrounds is unique in its ability to accommodate larger events and festivals right in the heart of Old Hilliard," she said. "This past year, the venue hosted events such as the Columbus Food Truck Festival, Soberfest, Jack O'Lantern World, and their flagship event — the Franklin County Fair — drawing tens of thousands of visitors to Hilliard for those events alone. Additionally, the venue acts as a springboard for emerging events with room for growth, creating a full events calendar most weekends."

Fleshman said she is hopeful that the best is yet to come. In 2024, the fairgrounds will add a coffee festival to its calendar, which has already boasted events as diverse as dinosaur shows, Jack O' Lantern World, and the non-profit group FESTA's 2023 inaugural event FESTAval.

"Our primary goal is to bring in as many ag-related events as possible," Fleshman said. "Beyond that, we just try to keep our buildings as full as possible, and our calendar of events has grown substantially over the past few years."

Growth and Recreation

The Lasting Legacy of Roger A. Reynolds, Hilliard's First Full-Time Mayor

The growth and development of modern-day Hilliard would not be possible without the leadership and vision of Roger A. Reynolds.

To the younger generation, the name likely sounds familiar as the namesake to Municipal Park. Fittingly, the growth of Hilliard recreation and parks remains one of his proudest achievements.

At 90, Reynolds remains active in the community and is one of Hilliard's biggest supporters. In many ways, he served as one of the founding fathers of Hilliard's City government.

Reynolds said his path to being elected as Hilliard's first full-time mayor in 1975 was an unusual one.

For the first half of his professional life, Reynolds worked as an accountant for Jeffrey Mining Machinery company in Columbus. In 1958, he and his wife, Phyllis, moved to Hilliard when it was still a village of less than 5,000 people.

His first appointed position came thanks to his desire to have sidewalks installed for children to walk safely to school. Reynolds showed up to a parent-teacher organization meeting one evening and was named president of the J.W. Reason Elementary PTO.

"Believe it or not, that one opportunity started my career in public service," Reynolds said. "Hilliard's superintendent later asked me to run for Hilliard City Council, and after I got elected in 1971 things really took off."

Reynolds quickly earned a reputation as a smart and trustworthy advocate for the Hilliard community. In 1972, he was granted a leave of absence from his employer to serve as Hilliard's Director of Service, Director of Safety, and Director of Recreation and Parks.

A few years later, the City created a paid position for a full-time mayor, and the rest was history. In total, Reynolds was elected to six terms as Hilliard mayor from 1975 until his retirement on Dec. 31, 1998.

"I'm so proud of everything we were able to accomplish, especially when it comes to recreation, the roads, and our relationship with the Hilliard City School District," Reynolds said. "My legacy is probably 'growth,' because I was very active in annexations to keep Hilliard as our own unique city. Over 24 years, we were able to secure land and form a master plan that's now benefiting the next generation."

In the early 2000s, the City officially dedicated Roger A. Reynolds Municipal Park, which serves as the home of the Recreation and Parks Department. The park's 130 acres of amenities includes the Hilliard Family Aquatic Center, baseball fields, a disc golf course, sledding hill, pickleball courts, and more. It also serves as home to Hilliard's signature event, Freedom Fest.

The future of Hilliard recreation sits just west of this location, with the addition of the 125-acre Hilliard Recreation and Wellness Campus opening in mid-2025.

"The Well is going to be a fantastic facility and something our community has been (desiring) for a long time," Reynolds said. "Our plan was to always expand Municipal Park, and it wouldn't be possible without the business growth and the income tax to support these amenities."

Reynolds' charisma and likeable personality made him a natural negotiator in landing business deals to further Hilliard's growth. During his tenure as mayor, the City's tax valuation increased more than 20-fold, with an operating budget that started at \$1.8 million in 1975 and grew to about \$12 million in 1998. In that time span, Hilliard's population growth also increased from 8,000 to 21,000.

"Although we're several decades apart, City Manager Michelle Crandall and I hold many of the same beliefs and philosophies, and I think she's doing a phenomenal job," Reynolds said. "She understands the importance of commercial and industrial growth and is really moving the city in the right direction."

Reynolds still lives in Hilliard with his wife. They both remain active in the community they love dearly.

"I've always said, there's a place for everybody here in Hilliard. In fact, that was one of our mottos," said Reynolds. "Hilliard is truly a unique, friendly community with such a bright future. I'm just glad I was able to play a small part in what it is today."

Upon entering a City of Hilliard recreation facility and/or participating in a Recreation and Parks Department program, you are agreeing to abide by the rules of the department and any specific rules for programs or facilities. Your cooperation and consideration of this Code of Conduct helps ensure all participants can enjoy our programs, facilities, and parks. The Recreation and Parks Department is committed to providing a safe and welcoming environment for all our patrons and staff.

FAIR SHARE

The Recreation and Parks Department is largely financed through taxes paid by individuals living or working within Hilliard city boundaries. For that reason, we verify residency annually. Those who are unable to verify that they live or work within Hilliard city boundaries must pay a higher fee. We also delay activating pool memberships until verification of residency or employment is provided. We accept proof of residency or employment in person at our Community Center during normal business hours; via mail at Hilliard Community Center, 3800 Veterans Memorial Drive, Hilliard, Ohio 43026; by email at recandparks@hilliardohio.gov; or uploaded to a RecTrac account.

City Residents (R) receive the lowest rates. Having a Hilliard mailing address or attending Hilliard City Schools does not necessarily mean you live within city boundaries. We verify residency each year on the Franklin County Auditor's website. Renters must provide (in person or via email) a utility bill, government-issued ID, or other proof of residency.

Non-Residents Paying Hilliard Income Taxes also receive the resident rate. To prove employment, you must provide a valid government-issued ID and one of the following each year:

- A pay stub from the previous 30 days that includes the employee's full name and current address.
- Proof of employment on company letterhead with the signature of the patron's supervisor or company president.

School District/Non-Residents (NR) are those who neither live nor work within Hilliard city boundaries. These individuals pay a higher, unless the program is held at a Hilliard City School facility.

REFUNDS

Low Enrollment If a program/class does not meet the minimum requirement of participants, the class will be canceled and a full refund will be issued to those enrolled.

General Recreation Program Any cancellation or request for a refund prior to 10 days of the start of the program/class will result in a full refund. If a cancellation or refund request is needed within the 10-day window of that program/class starting, a 10% processing fee will be charged. If the cancellation drops the program/class below the minimum student enrollment, a refund will not be issued.

55 Plus A full refund is issued if registration is canceled before the posted deadline. Refunds less than \$10 are automatically credited to your household account. Trip registrations canceled after the posted deadline are not eligible for refunds unless there is a waiting list and someone is able to take your place.

Pool Membership No refunds are issued for pool memberships.

Summer Rec Camps Cancellations before May 1 will result in a \$50 processing fee. After May 1, no refunds will be issued.

Swim Lessons Refund requests and/or transfers must be submitted in writing at least seven days in advance of the first class to **parks6@hilliardohio.gov**. Refunds may reflect a \$5 processing fee and are granted only for medical restriction, approved hardship, or relocation outside of a 25-mile radius of the Community Center. Documentation is required.

We offer a 10% discount for active duty and veteran military personnel and their immediate families for pool memberships, rentals, and activities. This excludes daily pool admission. Military ID must be provided in person to receive the discount.

AQUATICS 2024

Hilliard operates the Hilliard Family Aquatic Center (HFAC) and the Clyde "Butch" Seidle Community Pool (CBS). In addition to providing safe spaces for families to play and spend time together, the municipal pools also organize swimming lessons and activites for community members of all ages.

Hilliard's Station Park and the CBS Pool splash pads operate mid-May through Sept 30.

Children 13 and under must be accompanied by an adult 21 or older and must have their visitor pass or membership to visit the pools. Children ages 14-17 may enter without an adult if they have a valid visitor pass or membership and have a completed "Minor Use and Rules Agreement Form" on file. That form can be found online at hilliardohio.gov/pools-passes/. Completed forms can be uploaded on a RecTrac account, emailed to recandparks@ hilliardohio.gov, or dropped off at the Community Center, 3800 Veterans Memorial Drive.

POOL AREAS AND AMENITIES

A pool membership or daily admission guarantees use of the main pool at either facility. We reserve the right to reduce hours or close one or more pools, specific amenities, or facilities if the need arises due to staffing, programming, or weather.

POOL MEMBERSHIPS

Pool passes are valid at both locations. Key fobs allowing admission are mailed to new members and to members who buy add-on passes for the first time. Membership key fobs/add-on passes are not re-issued each year. Keep key fobs from season to season to avoid paying a \$5 replacement fee. All members must present key fobs at the gate or use the City of Hilliard App to enter either facility. Otherwise, members must pay daily admission.

Membership forms are processed as soon as possible after they are received. Staff verifies residency for all applications within three business days with Franklin County Auditor's Office. Each membership is limited to two adults (age 21 and up) who live at the same address. Memberships are non-refundable and nontransferable.

BUY YOUR MEMBERSHIP

Online - Those with 2023 memberships may renew online at **hilliardohio.gov/pools-passes**. New memberships must register an account online before purchasing. Online account activation may take up to three business days.

DAILY ADMISSION

For increased patron safety, all patrons ages 3 years and older must have a current pool membership or daily admission visitor pass associated with a valid RecTrac account to enter any pool facility. Visitors or members under age 18 must be registered under an adult's (21+) account. That adult assumes responsibility for the visitor.

Account registration must be done before visiting the pool. It can be done online or at the Hilliard Community Center during normal business hours. Online account activation may take up to three business days. After an account has been registered, free day pass key fobs are provided to each household member. Replacement fobs are \$5 each.

Visitors must present their key fob to enter the facility. Children 13 and under must be accompanied by a responsible party (18+) in addition to presenting their visitor pass. Children ages 14-17 may gain admission without an adult if they have a valid visitor pass and have a completed "Minor Use and Rules Agreement Form" on file.




